We'll go over benefits of beekeeping, "Bee Biology 101," equipment needed & how to set up an apiary, how to get and manage bees, and what to expect in the first year as a beekeeper, including the time commitment, honey harvesting, & more. We'll have equipment on display and a PowerPoint with plenty of pictures to give a clearer picture of what's involved! There will be plenty of time for Q&A, and children are welcome.

The orientation is a preview of our full-scale beginning beekeeping course, which runs 6 Saturdays, 9 a.m. to noon, starting January 21 at Centralia College (same room & address as above). This class is part of Centralia's Continuing Education program and focuses on how to keep bees in southwest Washington's unique weather conditions.

PREPARE FOR NEW ANTIBIOTIC REGULATIONS

The U.S. Food and Drug Administration has released new antibiotic regulations that affect all U.S. poultry and livestock producers, including youth exhibitors. The National Pork Board is urging all its stakeholders to get ready now, before the new regulations go into effect on January 1, 2017.

The Pork Board has introduced the **USCARE** checklist that offers six key steps for producers and exhibitors to prepare for these regulatory changes. For additional information, visit www.pork.org/antibiotics

PROPOSED CHANGES TO NATIONAL ORGANIC LIVESTOCK/POULTRY STANDARDS

In case any of you deal with 4-Hers with organic livestock/poultry products, you might suggest they read the proposed changes to the national organic standards and comment on the proposed changes if they are so inclined. Below is one excerpt that specifically addresses 4-H project poultry. More details than you ever wanted to know are at https://www.regulations.gov/document?D=AMS-NOP-15-0012-0001.

- >USDA-AMS has proposed "amending the organic livestock and poultry production requirements, in order to ensure consistent application of the USDA organic regulations for organic livestock and poultry operations and maintain confidence in organically labeled products." The proposed rule "addresses four broad areas of organic livestock and poultry practices, including living conditions, animal healthcare, transport, and slaughter." This announcement was made in April and comments are due by July 13.
- (d) The producer of an organic poultry operation may temporarily confine birds. Each instance of confinement must be recorded. Operations may confine birds because of:
 - (1-7 deleted here to save space/time and focus on):
- (8) 4-H, National FFA Organization, and other youth projects, for no more than one week prior to a fair or other demonstration, through the event and up to 24 hours after the birds have arrived home at the conclusion of the event. These birds must have been maintained under continuous organic management, including organic feed, during the extent of their allowed confinement for the event. Notwithstanding the requirements in paragraph (d)(6) of this section, facilities where 4-H, National FFA Organization, and other youth events are held are not required to be certified organic for the participating birds to be sold as organic, provided all other organic management practices are followed.
