4-H Youth Development Program

Updates: Public Presentation events were held on Friday, April 18 in Shelton and Saturday, April

19 in Belfair. In 4-H, idea sharing in a structured way is called a public presentation. As a 4-H member, you are expected to give public presentations as part of your total 4-H

experience. Each time a member presents, they learn to speak more easily and effectively before groups so that their ideas become organized and readily understood

into a successful presentation. Members learn important public speaking and communication skills. This year approximately 80 4-H youth participated in Public

Presentation events.

4-H STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Math) continues to provide activities at the Shelton Timberland Library. On April 16 youth participated in Wacky Science Earth

Day projects.

Updates: Preparation of project summary and budget for SNAP Ed grant is nearing completion. Due

date is May 9. State F\$ team and OSPI partnering on a Team Nutrition grant to develop Smarter Lunchroom Design in several counties. Mason County F\$ will pilot this program, if awarded, in three elementary schools. Rehired a part time educator for three months to help accomplish goals set out in contract but delayed due to delay in fund allocation from federal

government.

Water Resources Program

Mission: The Water Resources program helps members of our community make the best choices

in caring for our local waters by providing research-based tools and information. We connect people with appropriate resources through collaboration with other extension

Updates: Planning is continuing for the May on Oakland Bay event which will be held on May 18th,

11 am-4pm at Flying Dog Farm. The free, family-friendly event will include farmers market booths, educational exhibits, a bird walk, tree planting, tribal storytelling, and live music. Planning also continues for the regional Do Some Good for the Hood and Puget Sound Starts Here months to support volunteer, education, and outreach

opportunities.

additional community garden beds - site visit conducted May 1.

The Plant Sale is May 9 & 10 at Kneeland Park, final organizational meeting has been held and plants and volunteers are ready for sale. 100th Anniversary of Extension will be featured during the sale on Friday from 11am - 1 pm.

Three scripts associated with various Noxious Weed issues have now been prepared for the "Off the Land in Mason County" radio show on KMAS. Pat recorded a radio segment with Jeff Slakey for the Environmentally Sound radio show on Earth Day.
