Program Updates

4-H Youth Development Program

Mission: 4-H Youth Development empowers youth to reach their full potential, working and

learning in partnership with caring adults.

Updates: Mason County 4-H Summer Camp was held August 3rd – 8th at Panhandle Lake 4-H

Camp. During this six day educational experience Panhandle was home to 87 youth campers, including 13 Japanese youth. The Japanese youth were part of the 4-H International Exchange Program; attending 4-H camp is an important part of their month long visit to Washington State. Camp is a valuable learning experience that helps boys and girls appreciate the outdoors, live together as a group and appreciate people with different interests and backgrounds. Camp was staffed by 35 trained adults and teen counselors who provided leadership, educational activities, nutritious meals and mentorship to the youth campers. Many campers have indicated a strong desire to become a counselor-in-training and then a teen counselor as they approach the appropriate age for these roles. Camper registrations were slightly above projected numbers for this year.

Updates: WSU Extension and the Office of Superintendent of Public Instruction have been

awarded a grant from USDA Team Nutrition. WSU Extension Food \$ense program in Mason County will be hiring a part time educator to work in three local schools to develop a Whole School Approach at Mt. View Elementary, Pioneer Intermediate, and

Mary M. Knight Elementary. This is a two year grant.

Water Resources Program

Updates: During the month of August, I produced and mailed 350 informational postcards to

property owners on Hood Canal as an invitation to participate in the shoreline vegetation grant. Participants will receive free shore-friendly plants, mulch, and planting instructions in an effort to assist homeowners in improving and maintaining

the health of Hood Canal.

Significant current partnerships include: Mason Conservation District, Mason County Public Health, Taylor Shellfish, Mason ECO Net, Puget Sound Partnership, and Native

Plant Salvage.

Master Gardener Program

Updates: Harvesting of produce from Catalyst Park continues with all the donations going to

Saint's Pantry Food Bank. In August the food bank experienced record high numbers of individuals accessing food at the site. 1,000 individuals received food which included 350 pounds per week of fresh produce grown at Catalyst Park by Master Gardener

volunteers.

Small Farms Program

Updates: Ecological Farming Weekend Course: T.B.A. Currently developing curriculum to offer a

weekend long course on farming practices and niche markets specific to Mason County community. This course seeks to introduce landowners to innovative and unique production strategies that allow an opportunity for developing their land to meet regional conservation goals while maximizing economic return on their investments. Topics include water resource management, vegetation (weed) management, and

agroforestry. Max. 30 registrants.

Updates: The Noxious Weed Control program continues to capitalize on good weather and the

availability of additional personnel to reduce the impacts of noxious weeds in Mason County. Collaboration with Olympic National Forest personnel, PUD #3 interns and 2

WCC crews resulted in noxious weed control on well over 90 acres of land

within Mason County.
