Noxious Weed Program

Updates: Mason County Noxious Weed Control program staff provided training in plant ID, field

safety and noxious weed control techniques to a six person Washington Conservation Corps (WCC) crew working to remove invasive species in riparian areas of Mason County. This crew is currently deployed to the Carlton Complex in eastern Washington

supporting the emergency fire efforts there.

With funding from a WSDA grant, nearly 40 letters were sent to property owners in the Sherwood Creek area requesting permission to survey for, and treat, knotweed and other noxious weeds.

The program had a booth at Allyn Days and the Mason Area Fair providing noxious weed information to visitors and residents of the county.
