Updates: Warm and humid weather conditions are contributing to an increase in insect

populations and plant diseases. We have also noticed a large number of questions regarding vole problems. The garden at Catalyst Park is experiencing loss of seedlings from voles and an infestation of flea beetles. Work is continuing on scheduling docents for the 2014 Through The Garden Gate Garden Tour which will be held on July 12, 2014 9 am – 4 pm. The seven featured gardens will be in the City of Shelton including the beds and rain garden at WSU Mason County Extension. Tickets cost \$12 each and are

available at local retailers.

Small Farms Program
