Updates: Coordinated the first phase of a grant from the Puget Sound Partnership to build the

capacity of the Mason Education, Communication, and Outreach Network (Mason ECO Net). The first phase of the grant was to conduct a survey of the membership to learn more about the members and the organizations they represent, the motivators and barriers to participation in the ECO Net, and suggestions for improvements. Mason ECO Net provides education, outreach, and involvement with partner organizations to motivate and inspire our community's understanding and stewardship to sustain and

improve our environment.

Updates: Working Riparian Buffer Feasibility Study: Developing a framework to bridge the gap

between agricultural landowners and environmental regulators on water quality issues surrounding the Puget Sound. This project presents an opportunity for new niche markets and agricultural production systems that focus on tree crops along riparian ecosystems. This has a tremendous potential to positively impact agricultural and economic development within Mason County while supporting stakeholder objectives

towards protecting our sensitive aquatic natural resources.
