

Despite record setting rainfall during the month of October, field staff were still on the ground completing knotweed surveys along nearly 5 miles of the North Bay shoreline with funding from the Washington State Department of Agriculture.

And, on November 16, staff participated in the Olympic Invasives Working Group's fall meeting at the Jamestown S'Klallam Tribal Center near Sequim, WA. Hosted by Clallam

County Noxious Weed Control Board, the meeting provided an opportunity for nearly

100 Olympic Peninsula Weed Warriors to share ideas, review accomplishments, learn from expert speakers and obtain Applicator License credits. This year, Andy Mackinnon, co-author of "Plants of the Pacific Northwest Coast" was the keynote speaker.

Food Sense Nutrition

Updates: SNAP-Ed Nutrition Programs continues to provide nutrition education support to our

most needy families this holiday season. Educator Pamela Bish assembled holiday food preparation and food safety handouts in English and Spanish for Saint's Pantry Food Bank clients. These focused on safe handling techniques for thawing and cooking turkeys plus USDA-approved recipes for healthy Thanksgiving and holiday dinner

entrees, sides and desserts.

In addition, we distributed applications in English and Spanish for WA State DSHS Food Assistance as the holiday season tends to bring new clients who are not receiving services to Saint's Pantry for food and community support.

Water Resources Program

Mission: The Water Resources program helps members of our community make the best choices

in caring for our local waters by providing research-based tools and information. We connect people with appropriate resources through collaboration with other extension

programs, government agencies, businesses, schools, and other organizations.

Updates: The Water Resources Program continued implementation of the Hood Canal Pollution

Identification and Correction Outreach and Education program, which will continue through the end of 2016. WSU Mason County will be putting forward a formal announcement for this position the first week of January 2017. With this new hire, WSU will begin to focus more heavily on developing citizen networks to that invite public participation in water resource education. This includes revitalizing "Shore Stewards" and developing a Master Composter program to assist residents in better managing

nutrients and septic systems.

Significant current partnerships include: Mason Conservation District, Mason County Public Health, U.S. Environmental Protection Agency, and Puget Sound Partnership.

Small Farms Program

Mission: Work to build a socio-ecologically sustainable agricultural community through

education, outreach and conservation programs.

Updates: The Small Farms Team has been focused on developing new funding opportunities

related to improving agricultural production and food processing capabilities within Mason County. Resources necessary for growing Mason County's agricultural landscape and economy are continually being identified. Ideas centered around regional food-

processing and distribution are being heavily explored.
