## **Know & Grow Workshops**

## Know & Grow workshops offer gardening guidance.

No matter what your level of gardening prowess, sometimes you need a little more information than a book can provide.

Enter the Know & Grow workshops, a series of presentations provided by WSU Skagit County Extension Master Gardeners, in partnership with the WSU Northwestern Washington Research and Extension Center (NWREC) in Mount Vernon.

The workshops typically are held at the NWREC auditorium the third Tuesday of each month from March through November. They cover a range of gardening topics and often include a hands-on component. Past subjects include vegetable gardening, dealing with winter damage, and designing sustainable landscapes.

Interactivity is what these workshops are all about. Attendees can ask questions of the local experts and Master Gardeners who present each workshop, which combine the latest in horticultural research with practical gardening advice. Sometimes the topic under discussion allows everyone to get their hands dirty by stepping into the Discovery Garden next door to practice their newfound knowledge—it's the old "learn by doing" approach.

Most Know & Grow workshops are free of charge, but some come with a small fee or donation to help offset the cost of hosting these education opportunities, which were begun in 2006, after the completion of renovations and the new auditorium at NWREC. The WSU Master Gardener program felt the timing was right to build an educational partnership with scientists conducting research in areas of interest to home gardeners.

We choose our topics based on what you home gardeners might find interesting, while drawing on the expertise of our local speakers. The workshops are timed to coincide with seasonal gardening tasks, such as pruning in early spring and planting bulbs in the fall. The formula of timely advice and hands-on learning has proven successful so far: Our most successful workshop focused on winter tasks for fruit trees and was attended by more 130 people.

Keep your eyes peeled for more Know & Grow workshops during the coming months; our May workshop will spotlight drip irrigation (see sidebar).
