



Carol Hood said the tour could be helpful for farmers with cows or goats.

"Everyone needs to learn to reduce their mud, compost manure and keep their water clean," she said. "It's not an easy chore."

Carol said they give a lot of their horse manure to area residents who use it as compost for gardens.

After living in the Or-

chards area of Vancouver for 33 years, the Hoods moved to Fern Prairie in 2004.

"We enjoy the coyotes, frogs, the open air smell and the space," Carol said. "Sometimes it gets a little windy, but we get through that. It's just plain serene."

"We love the horses," she added. "We enjoy interacting with them. Sometimes they misbehave. We thoroughly enjoy it. I had horses as a kid. Horses are easier than children. They don't talk back. They don't ask for much."

The Hoods, married for 40 years, have three grown children, nine grandchildren and one great grandchild. Three horses have been born at Fern Prairie Paints.

When the Hoods got married, they did not have a reliable car. Carol owned two horses at that time. They could not afford to keep the mare and foal and buy a car, so they found someone who would trade the horses for a car—a 1955 Chevy.

In 2003, the Hoods traded a 1967 Chevelle for two mares.

"What goes around, comes around," Carol said. "This has been a dream come true for me."
