# Expo covers mud, pests, paperwork

The first-ever Small Acreage Expo in Clark County, Wash., provided farmers and other landowners a wealth of information on how to manage their land.

The expo, held April 22 at Brigands HideOut in Battle Ground, offered educational sessions in topics such as pasture management, managing mud and runoff, controlling weeds and insects, deciding on a tractor and fencing your property. The event was sponsored by WSU Extension Clark County in conjunction with the Clark County Clean Water Program and the Clark Conservation District.

Horse owner Karin Hunt of Shady Springs Farm shared in a session how she was able to divert water and, in turn, mud away from her animals and property.

"You don't have to have a lot of money to not have mud," she said.

Some of her solutions included oversized gutters and downspouts, diverting water into a pond and using a bioswale moving away from the property. She also doesn't let her horses go to pasture on all of the pieces of land at all times of the year, which protects the animals and the watershed. Hunt also received a grant for constructing winter paddocks on her acreage.

Mike Maghetti of Animal Management Systems made suggestions and answered questions on fencing. He went over the types of fencing available and what to watch out for when installing it for different animals. Specific materials were also discussed.

"If you're going to build a permanent fence, don't buy cheap stuff," he said. Round, treated posts and galvanized nails are preferred.

Sherri Brown attended one of Maghetti's sessions. Thave 5 acres, and I've been wanting to learn about fences," she said. "I'm hoping someday to have a farm."

with the Washington Department of Agriculture. Attendees were given basic economy information as well as specifics in areas such as advertising and farmers' markets.

A total of 104 people attended the expo.

"We had a lot of more recent landowners, and people either had animals or needed solutions and were looking for ideas for what to do," said Erin Harwood, Small Acreage Program coordinator for the Clark County WSU Extension.

Vic and Marta Drury of Yacolt were two more recent landowners. "We thought we'd come out and learn how to care for our acreage," Vic said. The couple hasn't any definite plans for their property yet, but they were looking for ideas.

Harwood went over the evaluation forms after the event and was pleased with the response overall.

"It was good to know they were excited about the program," she said. "It seemed most speakers did a good job of hitting it at the right level."

Previously, the extension office has been offering a 12-week class series twice a year on "living on the land." The expo was a new way to present information for those who can't attend a more lengthy series of classes. The expo will most likely replace one of the two class series next year.


