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4-H Calendar

4-H History

4-H didn't really start in one time or place. It began around the start of the 20th century in the work of several people in different parts of the United States who were concerned about young people.


The seed of the 4-H idea of practical and "handson" learning came from the desire to make public school education more connected to country life. Early programs tied both public and private resources together for the purpose of helping rural youth.

During this time, researchers at experiment stations of the land-grant college system and USDA saw that adults in the farming community did not readily accept new agricultural discoveries. But, educators found that youth would "experiment" with these new ideas and then share their experiences and successes with the adults.

4-H History (continued)

So rural youth programs became a way to introduce new agriculture technology to the adults. A.B. Graham started one such youth program in Ohio in 1902. It is considered the birth of the 4-H program in the U.S. When Congress created the Cooperative Extension Service at USDA in 1914, it included boys' and girls' club work. This soon became known as 4-H clubs - Head, Heart, Hands, and Health.

Nearing its 50th anniversary, 4-H began to undergo several changes. In 1948, a group of American young people went to Europe, and a group of Europeans came to the United States on the first International Farm Youth Exchange. Since then, thousands of young people have participated in 4-H out-of-state trips and international exchanges. 4-H began to extend into urban areas in the 1950's. Later, the basic 4-H focus became the personal growth of the member. Life skills development was built into 4-H projects, activities and events to help youth become contributing, productive, self-directed members of society. The organization changed in the 1960's, combining 4-H groups divided by gender or race into a single integrated program.

"Politics and the Media" is the theme for the 2011 4-H Know Your Government Conference, which will February 19-22, 2011 in Olympia. This year, participants will explore media and the use of media to affect change in their community. At the conference in
February, delegates will
gather news stories, conduct interviews, and produce a news broadcast video. This is open to grades 9-12 and a great experience for all those who participate!

Citizenship Washington Focus (CWF) is a weeklong 4-H citizenship program for youth ages 14-19.

Through sightseeing tours in Washington, D.C. and hands-on educational workshops, youth will learn about the history of our nation and how they can apply their leadership and citizenship skills when they return home. You will get to tour: the Capitol, Mount Vernon, Arlington National Cemetery, Presidential and War Memorials, and Smithsonian Museums.

Cyberbullying: What Parents and Educators Can Do

Recently the tragic story of Rutgers University freshman, Tyler Clementi, captured the national spotlight and galvanized attention on the relationship between suicide and cyberbullying, especially among gay, lesbian, bisexual, transgender and questioning (GBLTQ) teens.

Parents and those who work with young people are concerned about these issues with good reason. Research shows that suicide attempts among GBLTQ teens are four times that of heterosexual youth. While many GBLTQ students are well adjusted and fully accepted by their families and in their schools, too many are harassed, mistreated and victimized.

Today the instantaneous "viral" nature of YouTube videos and other social networking technologies exacerbate the dangers of cyberbullying. In response to the national

focus on these issues, CYFERnet's Hot Topic examines cyberbullying and sexting, what parents and educators need to know and what they can do to help young people in their families, schools and communities.

Since Horse certificates must be in at least 30 days prior to the show, these dates also determine the deadline for them to be turned in to the 4-H office. To be eligible for all shows your Horse Certificate(s) must be in by March 2, 2011.

The Horse Certificate originals were mailed

back to the Club Leader after being signed for the 2010 season. So if you are going to be riding the same horse this year, make sure that that original gets turned in on time for you or a new one filled out for a different horse.
