It's Time To Edit The Fair Premium Books!

In the Fall of 2014, the WA State Fair Association (WSFA) learned that the WSDA had eliminated the Fair Fund as part of their budget proposal.

The following statements provided in the <u>WA Fairs Economic I mpact Report</u> completed in 2006 create the foundation for our reasons to continue receiving the full balance of the Fair Fund:

In 2005 7.8 million people attended
 events held at fairgrounds
 throughout Washington State, more
 than the state population of 6.3

million people (Washington State Office of Financial Management, 2006). By comparison, 4.6 million people visited Seattle Center and approximately 1.2 million attended events at Key Arena in 2005 (Beyers, 2006).

- Gross economic impacts from Washington State fairs and other fairground activities were between \$350 million and \$385 million in 2005.
- Fairs and fairground activities supported between an estimated 5,630 to 5,807 temporary jobs in 2005 with numerous more volunteer opportunities.
- Estimated labor income for all jobs related to the fairs is between \$48 million and \$51million in 2005.
- Estimated tax revenues generated by fair and non-fair gross economic activity range between \$22.7 million

and \$25.0 million in 2005.


- Fairs and other fairground activities
 played a vital role in fund raising for
 many non-profit groups throughout
 the state.
- In addition to the economic contribution that fairgrounds provide to the state, they can also provide a space for emergency services (The Daily Herald, 2006).

Put The Child First

WSU Extension remains committed in its

efforts to prevent the abuse and exploitation of children and vulnerable adults. Preparedness and Prevention of PEDv

The transition to cooler temperatures brings with it heightened concerns regarding Porcine Epidemic Diarrhea virus (PEDv) and the potential for a repeat of last year that saw a rapid rise in the number of PEDv cases. With the benefit of more knowledge, better diagnostics and new tools to help combat the disease, pork producers and veterinarians are better equipped to deal with an outbreak. The challenge is taking advantage of these advancements to properly plan for, prepare for and help prevent an outbreak.

This webinar will reveal strategies for preparing and protecting farms to help mitigate the risks of a PEDv outbreak. An expert panel featuring Dr. Matt Ackerman, Jeb Stevens and Dr. Rick Swalla will offer practical tips that pork

producers, veterinarians, farm owners

and sow unit managers can use. Topics will include biosecurity protocols, contain-



ment and management strategies, impact on workers and finances, and ongoing collaboration to better identify and help prevent the spread of future emerging infectious diseases.

Here's what participants will learn from this webinar:

- 1. Ways to enhance farm biosecurity protocols and treatment plans
- 2. Containment and management strategies used to fight the disease Ongoing efforts to help producers and veterinarians be more prepared.

2015 Clean Tech Competition

Registration is now open for the 2015 Clean Tech Competition, a global research and design challenge for 15-18 year-old students. This year's challenge is to "Feed the World." This educational opportunity challenges students to develop innovative, clean technology solutions to real-world issues. Solutions may take on aspects of growing, harvesting, distributing, or any other aspect of food availability. Student participants will gain experience with focused research, critical thinking, and the scientific process - making it a great project based learning opportunity.

There is no entry fee, and students can participate through school, extracurricular programs, or on their own. The 1st Place Team will win \$10,000 and Finalist Teams can win \$1,000 for their school/

organization. The Finalist Event will be held in Philadelphia, PA in May 2015, when Finalist Teams will meet to explore fun and educational activities, present

to a live panel of judges, and network with industry professionals.

There is no limit to the number of Teams per organization - so spread the word! Each stage of



the competition is designed to be a rewarding process, and more student participation means inspiring more young scientists to help build a better future for our planet.




Widening the Circle:


