The HEART of 4-H

As we begin a new year in 4-H, I hope we can all reflect on the past year and the great accomplishments that you have all done. Whether you be a 4-H member, parent, or leader, you have done great things this year in 4-H to "make the best better". I would like to focus our

new year on the four essential elements to 4-

H. They hold true, no matter what your age is.

The first element is **belonging**.

- -Belonging to something that is important to you, is important for people; whether that be 4-H, a favorite hobby, holiday gatherings with those you love, a sport you wait all year to play, etc.
- -Relationships with positive people are a key element to belonging. We need to strive to make sure we have and are strong, positive, caring people, not only for our own belonging, but for others and their need to belong as well.
- -Safe, inclusive environments (both <u>physically</u> and <u>emotionally</u>) are important for all people within a group to feel like they belong. Everyone within your club should feel as though they can express their ideas or feelings without worry of being picked on or made fun of. We all have positive attributes that can help our clubs become better and we need to share our talents within our club to help make them more successful.

The second element is *Independence*.

- -Using skills learned in 4-H can relate to your future. The ability to harness hope and optimism to shape positive life choices is a powerful skill, especially starting as young people and moving into adulthood, but for adults as well. The skills learned in 4-H can help you be more confident in your club and in your life.
- -Believing that you have an impact over life's events rather than passively submitting to the will and whims of others is self-determination. The more confidence you build in yourself with successes and failures, the better control you can have over your life as you learn to stand up for yourself when appropriate and to do it efficiently and effectively.

The third element is *Mastery*.

-An engaged youth or adult who is mindful of a subject area, building relationships and connections in order to develop understanding, is learning mastery. Through self-reflection, you have the ability to self-correct and learn from any experience whether positive or negative. The engaged learner has a high degree of self-



motivation and a large capacity to be creative, I challenge you to look for these skills as you work through your project areas this year.

-Mastery is the building on

knowledge, skills, and attitudes and then demonstrating the competent use of this knowledge and skill in the manner of a proficient practitioner. The <u>level</u> of mastery is dependent on the developmental ability of the individual. The development of mastery is a <u>process over time</u>. Mastery does not happen overnight, it must happen over time.

The fourth element is **Generosity**.

The <u>opportunity</u> to practice service for others. Finding one's self begins with losing

yourself in the service of others. Service is one way to gain exposure to the larger community in which they call home. As we grow with generosity, you will find that generosity starts small (within the family), and grows to add club level generosity, community, county, country, and world. Within 4-H, you'll find all of these opportunities placed before you in different ways. Your club may do a Christmas basket for a family in need. You may teach a class at Super Saturday to share your knowledge and skills with others in Chelan and Douglas Counties. You may be a part of a community-wide event to help fire victims in need. You might become an Advisory Board Youth member and help to shape 4-H for the state of Washington. You could host a club from another state this summer as part of an exchange program throughout the **country**. You could help pave the way for new gardens to be planted in Burundi, Africa as part of a program to help one of the poorest countries in the world become more self-sufficient. YOU can be the change and YOU can make the difference!

Food Preservation Projects




It is now a requirement that if your members are doing food preservation, there must be at least one trained leader in the club. The training can be done online at home for about \$25. Here is the link for more information:

Volunteer Hours Reporting

I am sad to report that only 7 volunteers (out of 197 total) from Chelan/ Douglas counties have reported their hours this past year. Those 7 volunteers gave 298 hours to the 4-H program. In Washington, the average value of a volunteer's time is well over \$25/hr. So, if all of our volunteers donated 42hrs/yr (which is the average reported by the 7 reporters), our counties should be reporting over 8,200 hours, at a value of: \$206,875. I believe that our Chelan and Douglas County Commissioners would see that as a pretty good value for the money they put into our program. As of now, they would get a report showing that 7 volunteers help make the club programs happen at a value of: \$7,450. I also know that many of you wonderful leaders out there are volunteering more than 3.5 hours a month of your time, especially during fair season. With budgets being cut from all angles, it is important to

show the huge impact we have on the community and that the services we provide to children are valuable and should be kept in the budget. All leaders (activity, project, club, resource) should be reporting hours. This is also tied to the liability insurance. Here is a link to

Join Us in Building School Gardens for 1000 Youth in Burundi

Dear Friends of Burundi 4-H,

...and help us raise money to start 4-H youth school gardening programs in Burundi, Africa. Burundi is one of the 3 poorest countries in the world and is working to heal from trauma and poverty caused by decades of civil war. More than 70% of families live on less than \$2 a day, and 46% of the population is under the age of 15. Children go to school hungry and spend the day in the classrooms with no electricity, running water, or nourishment. This project will help increase access to food, teach gardening skills and conflict resolution for youth in 9 schools in Burundi. Teachers, administrators, and community members will be trained in 4-H, Play for Peace, and using school gardens to teach students. During the month of December, Burundi 4-H Sister Schools Program is participating in GlobalGiving's Open Challenge. We have to raise \$5000 from 40 unique donors in just

31 days! If we succeed in the challenge, we will be able to continue fundraising on GlobalGiving and have the chance to win additional cash prizes if we raise the most money or have the highest volume of donors. Mark your calendars for Bonus Day on Wednesday, December

16th when online donations \$25-\$1000 will be matched at 20%. It is important that you donate early on Bonus Day, as GlobalGiving will have \$10,000 available for matching until the funds run out. International Exchange Opportunity!

American 4-H aged youth are eligible to apply for cultural immersion experiences in Japan, Costa Rica, South Korea and Norway during the 2016 summer months through the 4-H International Exchange

Program. All programs include predeparture orientation, adult chaperone, homestay with a local family, and cultural learning opportunities. All of the programs emphasize cultural immersion in a family setting (not tourism). Delegates may do some site seeing, but primarily will be experiencing life with a family which something tourists are not able to do. Through participating in **States' 4-H** International programs, youth can develop essential life

skills including critical thinking, resiliency, empathy, and self-responsibility. Please see below for brief outlines of each country experience.

JAPAN: must be age 12-18 8-week Dates: June 15 - August 11

4-week Dates: July 13 - August 11

8 week Nihongo Program (17 delegates maximum)

Cost \$3,190 plus airfare. (current airfare estimate is \$1,600-2,500)

For the first four weeks, stay with a host family in the Tokyo area, while attending an intensive Japanese language program.

After four weeks of the language program, you will move to a second host family for the regular four-week homestay program (see below).

4 Week Homestay Program (no maximum group size)

Cost \$1,990 plus airfare (current estimate \$1,600-2500)

Live with a Japanese host family for the month and experience daily life. You will be placed with a host

sibling of the same gender with similar age. A group camp is offered through Labo and Utrek (both are Japanese youth organizations)

SOUTH KOREA: age 12-18

Dates: July 15 - August 10 (+/- one day)

The summer program begins with a national departure orientation on July

15th. The following day, the delegates and their chaperone travel to Seoul, South Korea. After a two night arrival orientation led by Korea 4-H, they will meet their Korean host family. They will also attend a 2-3 day 4-H International Camp.

NORWAY: age 15-18 Dates: June 29 - July 31

Age and Capacity: 15 delegates maximum,

5 delegates minimum

Cost: \$2,185 plus airfare (current airfare estimate at \$1,500-\$1,900)

Delegates arrive in Oslo on July 1st for a two night arrival orientation, which includes an introduction to Norwegian culture and basic language phrases. Afterwards, delegates meet their Norwegian 4-H host family and begin the homestay (A host sibling of similar age in not guaranteed. Delegates may have more than one host family.). After the homestay, delegates will attend the Norway 4-H National Camp for seven days where they'll meet hundreds of other 4-Hers.

COSTA RICA: age 15-18

Dates: June 23 - July 22, 2016 Capacity: 10 delegates maximum, 5 delegates minimum

Cost: \$1,350 plus airfare. Current airfare estimate: \$850-\$1,400.

Delegates arrive in Costa Rica for a two night arrival orientation which includes sightseeing and cultural activities. Afterwards, delegates meet their 4-S (4-H) host families and begin their homestay. They will also participate in a variety of 4-S club related activities.

To learn more or to receive an application, please contact the state coordinator. All applications must be completed, reviewed, interviews conducted and state aspirants selected prior to the national application deadline of December 15, 2015.
