Preventative Maintenance Program Addition: "Belt Hog" By Eric Lockie

Facilities Services Maintenance division has



recently implemented the use of a laser alignment tool as part of the revitalized Preventative Maintenance Program.

As part of the standard operating procedure, we will be utilizing the **laser alignment system** to check for proper belt/pulley alignment whenever we change or inspect belts.

Proper belt alignment is critical to maintaining motor efficiency. Improper belt alignment can lead to inefficient power transmission, belt wear, belt failure and possible premature motor failure.

The major advantages of implementing the laser belt alignment into our PM program will be savings. These savings include energy, parts expenditures, down time and man power.

Energy saving will be realized do to the fact that a correctly aligned belt and pulley system creates less mechanical drag. This will help the motor to spin with less rolling resistance. With less rolling resistance the motor will not require as much energy, allowing it to operate at optimum efficiency. V-belt drives can have a peak efficiency of 95 percent or higher when installed properly, but efficiency can deteriorate by as much as 5 percent due to slippage created by improper tension and alignment.


Misalignment can cause sheaves to wear prematurely, and when that happens, a formerly flat groove sidewall can take on a concave shape and the surface that interacts with the belt can be damaged. Research has shown that eroded sheave/pulley sidewalls can reduce V-belt drive efficiency up to 12 percent, and operating sheaves/pulley's with rough, worn

sidewalls can cut V-belt life by as much as 50 percent.

The tool that we have chosen for this is the Vibrating Belt Hog. This tool uses the pulley groove as the reference, allowing you to achieve a precise belt alignment. Some of the features the belt hog as are

- **Measures from the grooves where the belts operate
- **No need to remove the belts
- **1-person operation
- **Easy to use tool with minimal training required

These Belt Hogs are located in both building group vans, as well as the Preventative Maintenance Office (McCluskey #87).



February's APP question and answers:

Five Requirements for operator of state vehicles: 15 possible correct answers...here's a few:

- 1. Always inspect your vehicle or equipment before and after daily use.
- 2. Do not ride on motorized vehicles or equipment unless a proper seat is provided for each rider.
- 3. Always be seated when riding authorized vehicles (unless they are designed for standing).
- 4. Do not operate any motorized vehicle or equipment unless you are specifically licensed, certified and/ or trained for its operation.
- 5. Always use your seat belts in the correct manner.
- 6. Obey all speed limits and other traffic regulations.
