# Clarification of Selected Rules in the PNW 4-H Horse Contest Guide for the Washington State 4-H Horse program

Effective July 1 to September 30, 2023

### **Background**

This addendum is intended to be a *clarification* of selected rules as identified by a subcommittee of the Washington State 4-H Equine Committee. See list of sub-committee members at the end of this addendum.

The following respective rules are **not new**, but are intended to provide clarification to existing rules, language and/or protocol.

For actual rule changes—please refer to Addendum I, which is a page by page review comparing the 2015 PNW 4-H Horse contest guide to the soon to be published 2022 PNW 4-H horse contest guide.

Please be sure to be familiar with PNW 4-H Horse Contest Guide, 2015 edition before using this as a reference.

## The PNW 4-H Horse Contest Guide-Background

3<sup>rd</sup> paragraph-top of page 3-*Reminder* 

Counties are bound by state rules but may be more restrictive. Counties should create rules and criteria for "county only" for classes not addressed in this guide.

Clarification #1: This means that counties in Washington 4-H using the PNW rules are bound by the PNW rules and may not make their rules less restrictive; however, counties may make more restrictive rules. **But cannot be contrary** to overall Washington 4-H Program Policies as listed in EM0758E (publication number) and found on WSU 4-H website.

Clarification #2: In open shows using the 4-H name and emblem are bound by PNW 4-H Contest Guide Rules and also the Washington State 4-H Program Policies. Failure to do so puts the respective county 4-H program as risk along with the any other sponsoring 4-H organization and will not be covered by WSU liability nor American Income life insurance.

#### **Show Protocol –page 6**

# 9 Existing Rule States: Exhibitors should not pat their horse while being judged in the ring, except during a colt or ground training class. [This rule was deleted in 2022 version]

Clarification #1: This means that the 4-H member can pat/pet/stroke their horse after completion of their class/course/pattern including Western Games run after the judging has been completed. Exception would be for in the Showmanship as per Showmanship Judging Requirements (p. 16-2015 version).

Clarification #2: Washington does not have a colt or ground training rules.

### **Western Section**

# **Bridle and Bit-**page 10

<u>Page 10:</u> Horses 5 years old or younger may be ridden in a snaffle or bosal. For horses 6 years or older, a *curb bit* is highly preferred.

<u>Clarification:</u> Additional clarification definition of a curb bit: "A curb bit is any leverage bit and should follow guidelines as identified by the United State Equine Federation Manual for western equipment.

## Page 10-paragraph 2:

### **Current Rule States:**

Horses 6 years and older shown in a snaffle or bosal may be ineligible for top awards at management's discretion. In **Washington**, such horses shall be ineligible to advance to performance state 4-H fair competitions,

Clarification: For Washington 4-H State Fair horses are eligible for Western Games and also Western Dressage as per WDAA rules.

Additional <u>selected</u> Summary Clarification for **Western Games** related to bits and bridles.

#### Required (page 35):

Throatlatch on the bridle Curb strap on all bits Roping or single piece reins

#### Allowed:

Bosals-page 10 Snaffles-page 10 Mechanical Hackamores-page 35 Gag Bits-page 35 Running Martingales with Rein Stops-page 35

#### *NOT allowed (page 35)*

Mecate Reins Tied split reins

#### **Buckled Reins**

### Page 11 as related to Bridle and Bits section

Not allowed—added a 5th bullet

Curb bits with overall bit length longer than 8 ½ inches not allowed

<u>Clarification:</u> The Figure on p. 11 is correct but a formal statement as a 5<sup>th</sup> bullet under **Not** Allowed was to provide further clarification.

### **In-hand Trail Section**

Page 21-second paragraph

Existing Rule: The horse must be unsaddled and shown in a safe, properly fitted halter. A chain may be used. Guidelines for the use of a chain and for the halter and lead may be found in the Showmanship section (pages 15–16).

### Clarification (to include "touching the horse"):

The horse must be unsaddled and shown in a safe, properly fitted halter. A chain may be used. Use guidelines for chain use, touching the horse, and halter and lead from showmanship class expectations on pages 15 and 16-Performance Guidelines-Showmanship.

#### **Western Games**

#### Penalties and general disqualifications-page 37

17<sup>th</sup> bullet

Existing Rule: Spurring or striking the horse in front of the cinch

Clarification: Youth are allowed to pet their horse in front of the cinch in a humane way, as perceived by the judge. Spurring, striking, (e.g., hitting or slapping) can be considered disqualification.
