Educational Opportunities

WSU Extension offers free forest and tree health seminars Learn why trees are dying and what to do

Dead and dying trees have proliferated throughout western Washington. Trees were particularly hard-hit in 2018, especially western red cedars, causing concern for many property owners. Washington State University (WSU) Extension Forestry will be giving free public seminars to explain why so many trees are dying right now and what property owners can do.

Learn what makes forests healthy or unhealthy and how to recognize when there's a problem on your property. Topics include insects, diseases, and drought, including their environmental roles and the important interactions between them. Learn about what property owners should do (and not do) to increase tree resilience and mitigate impacts. The seminar will be taught by Kevin Zobrist, associate professor of forestry at WSU and author of the book *Native Trees of Western Washington*.

Orca Awareness Month is a chance to celebrate one of our region's most iconic wildlife species and reflect on the plight of this fragile population. With just 75 Southern Resident orcas remaining, the survival of each individual is vital for the future of these critically endangered creatures. Orca Awareness Month is open to everyone, and provides all of us a great opportunity to educate, learn, and connect with our local communities about the Southern Resident orcas and the threats that they face. Learning about orcas inspires and engages people to take action to help protect and recover these beautiful, intelligent creatures and our shared Pacific Northwest home

Orca Salmon Alliance is organizing a number of **events** throughout the Pacific Northwest, and they are inviting others to organize events as well. The first event is in Seattle on **June 2** at the Olympic Sculpture Park, 1-5 pm. OSA's primary objective is to prevent the extinction of the Southern Resident orcas by recovering the wild Chinook populations upon which the whales depend for survival. kids and chaperones, using talking points to guide your session. We'll be at either Kayak Point or Mukilteo Lighthouse Park, and parking is free.

This is fun, high energy and always satisfying. Every year, I am stunned by how many students have NEVER been to the beach, and how many MORE had no idea about all the marine life that we share the shoreline with. Come and share your wonder.

Howarth Park Beach Wrack Survey Wednesday, May 22, at 10 AM

Once again, we step into the surf and head to Howarth Park. As usual, we will be identifying eelgrass, marine algae, and human debris (plastics). The marine algae will be divided up into Ulva (sea lettuce), Fucus (rockweed), and other.

Although it is always warm and sunny when we go to the beach, please be ready for anything. Please dress in layers and bring drinking water. Surveys usually take 2.5 to 3 hours. Contact Scott Calhoun (Class of 2016) for more information.

Break out your knee pads and field guides! It's time to start the intertidal beach characterization assessments for 2019. We'll do exciting things like measure rocks, look through hand lenses to properly name whatever critters we find, dig for clams and worms, take elevation readings with surveying equipment ...all the way to the waters'

edge. Even though we'll be looking at various pieces of the beach, the process has an amazing way of opening our vision to how all those parts play a role in creating the unique habitats that intertidal organism need.
