2022 Grassland Conservation Reserve (CRP) signup is open until May 13th!

The CRP program, is a federally funded voluntary program that contracts with agricultural producers so that environmentally sensitive agricultural land is not farmed or ranched, but instead used for conservation benefits. The FSA provides participants with rental payments and cost-share assistance. Contract duration is 10 or 15 years. Grassland CRP helps landowners and operators protect grassland, including rangeland, and pastureland, and certain other lands, while maintaining the areas as grazing lands. The program emphasizes support for grazing operations, plant and animal biodiversity, and grassland and land containing shrubs under the greatest threat of conversion. Grassland CRP is reauthorized by the 2018 Farm Bill. The Grassland CRP signup runs until May 13, 2022.

Applying for this grant is extremely quick and easy, it should take less than an hour, and there have been many successful applications! Your statement only needs to be a short paragraph or a couple of sentences.

Since the grant is reimbursing you for past expenditures, there are no stipulations on how you spend the money you receive, as long as you spend it on your business. Best of all, because it's a grant, you don't pay it back!

If you would like assistance looking through your P&Ls, you are welcome to email them to us. Even if you can't qualify for the whole \$10,000 grant, smaller amounts will also be awarded.



Value-Added Producer Grants are due April 25th!

The objective of this grant program is to assist independent producers, agricultural producer groups, and farmer and rancher Coops in starting or expanding value-added activities related to the processing and marketing of value-added agricultural products. Grants will be awarded competitively for either planning or working capital projects directly related to the processing and marketing of value-added products. Generating new products, creating and expanding marketing opportunities, and increasing producer income are the end goals of the program. All proposals must demonstrate economic viability and sustainability to compete for funding.
