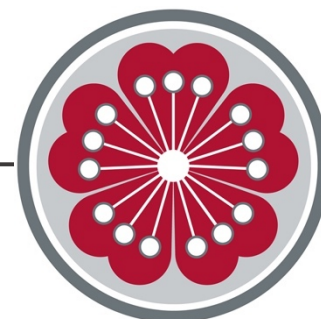

OVERVIEW

The WSU Extension Master Gardener (MG) Program provides people and communities with relevant, unbiased, research-based horticultural and environmental stewardship education. WSU Extension Master Gardener Volunteers (WSU MG Volunteers) are trained to be community educators and are the local go-to resource for people and communities seeking innovative solutions to horticultural needs and challenges. WSU MG Volunteers are highly recognized, diverse, and valued community members.



The WSU MG Program has a rich history, beginning in the Puget Sound area in 1973, and spreading to most counties in Washington. The first Asotin County WSU MG Volunteers were trained in 1995. Garfield County WSU MG Volunteers were first trained in 2004.

The local WSU MG Program is financially supported by fund raising, donations, and grants; administered and managed by the **Master Gardener Foundation of Asotin and Garfield Counties**, a 501(c)(3) non-profit organization.³ The Foundation is a dependent Chapter of the **Master Gardener Foundation of Washington State**.

In 2022, WSU MG Programs started to return to pre COVID-19 levels; with WSU MG Volunteer hours donated near pre COVID-19 levels – while total contacts continued to be down by **41% from pre-COVID levels**.

Certified WSU MG Volunteers donate a minimum of 25 hours per year to community service and education, and annually receive over 10 hours of specialized continuing education training on current research based horticultural practices. **Intern** WSU MG Volunteers donate a minimum of 40 hours to community service and education their first year after completing required training; meeting requirements to become a certified WSU MG Volunteer. **Emeritus** WSU MG Volunteers have volunteered a minimum of 500 total hours and/or have 10 years of volunteer service, and are no longer able to fully meet annual volunteer service certification requirements.

Master Gardener and Community Horticulture Training

In 2022, Bi-Annual Master Gardener and Community Horticultural Training was offered at the Asotin County District No. 1 Fire Station in Clarkston Heights, using a hybrid model of in-person and virtual via ZOOM. The classes were taught by experts in the field of horticulture from WSU, University of Idaho, WWCC, local specialists, and WSU MG Volunteers.

The 11-week intensive university level training offered 38 hours of education to community members, veteran MG Volunteers, and prospective MG Volunteers, from Asotin, Nez Perce, Garfield, Whitman, Latah, and Walla Walla Counties; resulting in **4 new intern MG Volunteers in Asotin and Garfield Counties**. All 4 completed required WSU coursework and community service hours to become certified WSU MG Volunteers.

In **2022**, WSU MG Volunteers in Asotin and Garfield Counties staffed office plant diagnostic clinics May - September in Asotin County and June – August in Garfield County. WSU MG Volunteers diagnosed plant problems, identified insects and plants, and answered a variety of questions using research-based horticultural and science-based gardening practices. Plant clinic contacts increased by 11% from 2021 – but still down 35% from pre-COVID levels (Garfield County plant clinic contacts were similar to pre-COVID levels). ⁵

Majority of questions answered related to growing **Local Food**, **Nearby Nature** landscape plants and trees, **Plant Biodiversity** (weed ID and management) **Program Priorities**.

COMMUNITY OUTREACH - Information & Education

In 2022, WSU MG Volunteers in Asotin County actively engaged in community outreach; hosting and teaching **42 information and educational clinics and events** in Asotin County.⁶ No events were held in Garfield County in 2022. Public participation **increased by 118% over 2021**; back to pre-covid levels. In addition to established programs (**Rose Clinic, Tree Clinic, Asotin County Fair, Asotin Farmers Market, Asotin County CattleWomens Plant Sale, Brown Bag Garden Series, and Fall Garden Series**) community outreach programs expanded; teaching **3 gardening classes at Lewiston Library Garden Series and 11 classes at Tri-State Memorial Hospital Wellness Programs**.

Majority of community outreach was related to growing **Local Food** and **Nearby Nature** landscape plants and trees **Program Priorities**

Clarkston Farmers Market: WSU MG Volunteers provided gardening information and responded to public inquiries at **6 Clarkston Farmers Markets**, contacting **47 community residents.**

Tri-State Memorial Hospital Wellness Program: WSU MG Volunteers partnered with Tri-State Memorial Hospital Wellness on their *Eat Healthy and Be Active* community program in July – November; teaching **11 sessions** on general gardening to **84 community residents.**

Asotin City Street Fair: WSU MG Volunteers provided gardening information and responded to public inquiries at Asotin City Street Fair held April 23 during the Asotin County Fair; **contacting 10 community residents.**

Lewiston Library Garden Series: WSU MG Volunteers partnered with Lewiston Library on a new community program in May – June; teaching **3 sessions** on general gardening reaching **27 community residents.**

Asotin County CattleWomen's Plant Sale: WSU MG Volunteers provided plant and gardening information and responded to public inquiries at the annual Asotin County Cattle Women's Plant Sale On May 6-7; contacting **16 community residents.**

Brown Bag Garden Series: WSU MG Volunteers hosted and led **11 Community Workshops** at Beach View Park in May thru July; teaching **139**

Fall Garden Series: The Master Gardener Foundation of Asotin and Garfield Counties and the WSU MG Program sponsored **3 hybrid** (virtual and in-person) community educational workshops; teaching **152 community residents** on a variety of *gardening topics*. Classes were taught by experts in the field of horticulture from WSU and local MGs.

Social Media: Social media accounts (Facebook and Instagram) were slightly more e active in 2021, with a **10% increase in followers** compared to 2021. Facebook is used mostly to promote community outreach events and activities.

Demonstration Garden: WSU MG Volunteers partnered with the Clarkston Community Garden to host **3 socials and open houses** to showcase gardening activities; reaching **40 community residents.**

In 2022, Youth Outreach events and formal school gardening programs at local elementary schools continued

to be a focus of WSU MG Volunteers in both Counties, with youth contacts, days in the “indoor and outdoor”, and hours donated increasing from 2021, but still down from pre-COVID levels.⁷

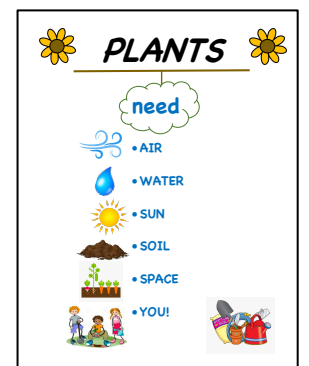
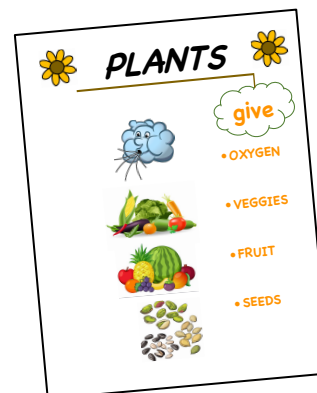
School Garden Programs: WSU MG Volunteers partnered with Parkway, Grantham, and Pomeroy Elementary schools to provide gardening instruction to 3rd and 4th graders. Programs at Parkway Grantham, and Pomeroy were all “outsider” in the school gardens in the spring; while fall programs at Parkway and Pomeroy were a mix of “outside and inside” classroom. No fall program at Grantham. School Gardens at Parkway and Grantham elementary Schools donated **96 lbs** of fresh produce to the Asotin County Food Bank.



Youth Arbor Day and Tree Planting Events: WSU MG Volunteers hosted Arbor Day Tree programs with 4th graders at Highland Elementary School in May, and planted a large Maple tree in October.



WSU Extension Youth Activity Camp: WSU MG Volunteers hosted youth gardening related classes during the 2-day WSU Extension Youth Activity Camp, held in July.

DEMONSTRATION GARDEN

- Community Garden Support

In **2022**, the Asotin County WSU Master Gardener Volunteers continued to maintain a Demonstration Garden at the Clarkston Community Garden; aligning with growing **Local Food** Program Priority. The Demonstration Garden consisted of 12 raised beds, 2 cold frames, a raised vertical garden area, and a wire tunnel area.

The amount of produce donated to the Asotin County Food Bank from the Demo Garden, **increased by 343% over 2021!** Two successful beds demonstrated companion plantings (cucumbers, Dragon Tongue bush beans, Suntastic Yellow Sunflowers, and leeks; and Three Sisters bed of Oaxacan Green Dent Corn, Flat Romano Beans, and acorn squash) – 85 total lbs produced. Other beds included three varieties of beets, Armenian cucumbers on trellis, variety of garlic, salsa bed, and melons – French Charentais, D'Artagnan, Hearts of Gold). 40 lbs of French Melon produced.

Demonstration Garden also partnered with Clarkston Community Garden on an Open House and two social events - **reaching 40 community members** (included in Community Outreach Contact number).

WSU MG Volunteers provided the Clarkston Community Garden with technical expertise - sharing horticultural information, teaching and demonstrating gardening and composting techniques, coordinating pest management, and partnering on community events. Also helped with developing a new compost system.

2022 State of the Foundation

Founded in 2004, the Master Gardener Foundation of Asotin and Garfield Counties (Foundation) enhances and financially supports the educational and outreach programs that further the mission and goals of the WSU Master Gardener Programs of Asotin and Garfield Counties; through fundraising efforts, donations, and grants. The Foundation serves to augment and supplement the community educational programs and activities of the WSU Master Gardener programs; while facilitating an exchange of ideas, information, and expertise. The Foundation prepares the annual budget and manages the funds. The Foundation is a dependent Chapter of the Master Gardener Foundation of Washington State (MGFWS); allowing the Foundation to have 501(c) non-profit status and receive tax-exempt gifts.

2022 Foundation Highlights:

- To date, there are **21** Foundation members; representing **66%** of eligible veteran WSU Master Gardener Volunteers (32) from both counties. An increase of **3** members from 2021.
- Foundation continues to be financially and fiscally sound; with total fund balance **\$22,152.54** at end of 2022. **Revenue of \$4494.66** was similar to budgeted and **expenses of \$3982.82 were 45% less** from budgeted.
- Completed new Memorandum of Agreement (**MOA**) between the Foundation and WSU Asotin County Extension. Goal to finalize by end of the year.
- Provided 6 raffle items for 2022 Advanced Education Conference; valued at \$355.
- 2 Foundation members served on MGFWS Board; actively participating and representing the Foundation.
- 3 Foundation members attended 2022 Advanced Education Conference.
- Received hundreds of seed packets from North 40 Outfitters for use in community and school programs.
- Sponsor of Fall Garden Series; revenue of \$575
- Received \$640 in Donations.
- Elected new Officers for 2023-2024 at Oct 18 Annual Meeting.
- Held 4 quarterly Foundation Board Meetings and 2 Special Budget Meetings.
- On October 14, 2023, the Foundation received a **\$5,000 grant** from Lewis-Clark Healthcare Foundation to support School Gardening & Nutrition Programs. Grant was extended due to COVID. To date, the grant balance is **\$ 438.67**.
