

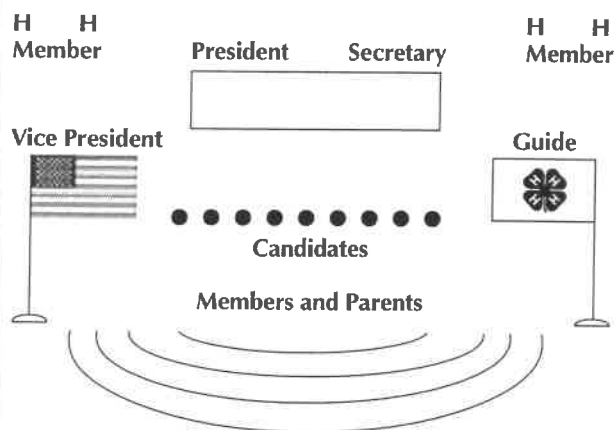
4-H SUPPLEMENTAL MATERIAL

4-H CEREMONIES

INITIATION CEREMONY

One way to welcome new members at the first meeting and to make them feel a part of the group is to have an initiation ceremony. It acquaints the members and their parents with the purpose and symbols of 4-H and what is expected of 4-H members.

President: We are happy to welcome _____
(name of new members) who want to join the _____
(club name) 4-H club. Would _____
(name of member) please present the candidates for membership for initiation? (A guide conducts the candidates to the front of the room where they stand facing the president and the participants.)



Suggested Arrangement for Initiation Ceremony

President: Before you accept the responsibility of 4-H membership we want you to know about the purpose of 4-H and the meaning of the symbols which represent the 4-H program. If each of us as a 4-H member were asked what 4-H is, each one might have a different answer. Some might say, "It's fun," or "It's learning new skills," or "It's making friends by working and playing together." Someone else might say, "It's the opportunity to be part of a group which does interesting and worthwhile things."

4-H is all of these. The purpose of 4-H is to help us to be better citizens by teaching us how to work and play together, by giving us a means of learning worthwhile skills, by developing our talents, and by

encouraging us to set high standards and goals. The 4-H program is a part of Washington State University's Extension program. It is conducted in each county in the state under the guidance of county Extension agents working with local 4-H leaders. Any boy or girl age 5 and in kindergarten through 12th grade who has not reached age 19 by Jan. 1 of the current 4-H year, regardless of race, color, or national origin, may become a 4-H member.

President: _____
(name of member) will tell you about our 4-H emblem.

Member: The emblem of 4-H is a green, four-leaf clover with four white H's, one on each leaf, standing for the development of the head, heart, hands, and health.

Member: As the first "H," I represent the head or the mind. 4-H provides many opportunities for us to think, plan, and reason. As 4-H members we pledge our heads to think clearly.

Member: I represent the heart "H." 4-H members pledge their hearts to greater loyalty to their club, community, country, and world. A good citizen is concerned about others, is kind and sympathetic.

Member: I am the third "H." I represent the trained hand, dedicated to the development of my talents and skills and to the service of others. If we as 4-H club members were to do merely what the head and heart would have us do, but without learning to use our hands, most of our talents would remain undeveloped. Our education would be one-sided. We would be able to think but not do. Thus, the third H becomes a necessary part of our emblem and our lives.

Member: I am the fourth "H," health. Without health you cannot do the work the other three H's would have you do. Health represents one of the great powers in your life. With health the hardest task will be made easy and the heaviest loads light. With my help you will be able to think more clearly, you will be kinder to those about you, and you will do your work easily and well.

President: The green of the emblem symbolizes life, youth, and growth. The white is for purity and high ideals.

The 4-H motto, "To make the best better" encourages members to try continually to improve. _____ (name of member) will explain what is expected of 4-H members.

Member: Our 4-H club wants every member to feel that he or she is joining something worthwhile. You will gain the most from 4-H if you attend meetings regularly, participate in the program, and develop leadership and project skills.

President: Now that you have learned something about 4-H, do you wish to become a member?

New Member: Yes, I do.

President: You will sign the roll of membership, after which you will receive instructions in the club pledge. (Candidates move in front of secretary.)

Secretary: (Secretary offers membership roll and candidates sign it; then, hands each candidate a copy of the 4-H pledge.) This is our 4-H pledge. Each member should learn it in order that he or she may be able to renew it at each club meeting. This pledge is given as follows: (Secretary gives pledge in illustration.) You will now repeat the pledge in unison with the other club members. (President gives three taps; all rise and give club pledge. Candidates move over in front of president.)

President: I wish to congratulate you and advise you that the leader and officers of your club will always be willing to assist you in your 4-H activities. (To guide) Please conduct the new members to their seats. (Guide takes new members to their seats.)

CANDLELIGHTING CEREMONY

Lights will be out except for lighted clover. Music will be playing softly as members enter the area. When all are in place, ceremony leader begins.

Ceremony Leader: Candlelighting is always associated with the beautiful and sublime. There is connected with it much of idealism and inspiration.

If we were asked to express what 4-H means to us, each of us might tell a different story. Many would find it difficult to put into words their real feelings.

This is often true of things that mean a great deal to us. When words seem inadequate, we symbolize as beautifully as we can that which we want to express. It is such a symbolic description that we are about to present tonight.

Ceremony Leader: From a small beginning, near the turn of the century, 4-H has spread throughout the United States and to many other countries.

4-H can be compared to a magnificent fire that is constantly being nurtured with the work of young men and women like us. The growth, expansion, and betterment of 4-H is world-wide since many nations now share in it.

I now light the flame which represents the spirit of 4-H. (Light large candle on table in front of Ceremony Leader.)

Head "H," would you approach and light your candle?

Head: I pledge my head to clearer thinking. (Lights candle from leader's candle and returns to place.) I would study and observe with an open mind in order that I may learn from life and books to speak with knowledge, act with good judgment, and grow in wisdom.

Ceremony Leader: Heart "H," would you approach and light your candle?

Heart: I pledge my heart to greater loyalty. (Lights candle from that held by Head and returns.) I would be loyal to my family, my friends, my country, and my ideals.

In my relations with others, I would be sympathetic and kind, thus enriching my own life with understanding, faith, and confidence in mankind.

Ceremony Leader: Hand "H," would you approach and light your candle?

Hand: I pledge my hands to larger service. (Lights candle from that held by Heart and returns to place.) May I so train my hands that difficult tasks will find me deft and skillful, that routine duties will be done well and efficiently, that I may serve others and find joy in my work.

Ceremony Leader: Health "H," would you approach and light your candle?

Health: I pledge my health to better living (lights candle from that held by Hand and returns to place) that I may be a useful citizen, doing my part fully and well. I would guard as a valued possession my good health.

Ceremony Leader: That the 4-H light may spread and grow, the four "H"s will bring the light to you. Cherish your light and spread it to others near you until all the candles are aglow.

(While the candles are being lighted, an appropriate song may be sung, or music played softly as "I Am 4-H" is read.)

Ceremony Leader: Lift high the 4-H candle which you have made alight as we repeat the 4-H pledge in the stillness of the night.

I pledge my head, etc.

You have now received a 4-H light. I charge you to guard and protect it that it may ever light the way to better understanding. May the knowledge and inspiration which you have received become an important part of your life and those with whom you share it.

As you now leave, carry your 4-H light in your hearts. Share it with other boys and girls so that they may have the privileges of 4-H.
