Principal Investigator. April, 2018. JUVENILE JUSTICE REPORTING.

This project provides annual and trend analysis of key juvenile justice findings in Washington State. The findings are compiled into a report to be presented to Governor Jay Inslee. This contract was sponsored by the Office of Juvenile Justice. This is a one-year project for \$20,000.

Principal Investigator. March, 2018. THERAPEUTIC TREATMENT COURTS EVALUATION.

This project provides a qualitative, quantitative and cost-benefit evaluation of the Snohomish County Therapeutic treatment courts. This contract was provided to Whitworth University via Snohomish County. WSU is provided the sub-award to provide qualitative and quantitative evaluations of the project. This is a one-year project for \$47,585.

Principal Investigator. September, 2017. JAIL TRANSITION PATHWAYS COMMUNITY HUB.

BJA Second Chance Act. This is a 36-month grant, focused on implementing “smart re-entry” programs for clients that are released from the Spokane County jail. The first year of the project will require Spokane County and the City of Spokane to develop a Reentry Task Force to build a planning and implementation guide, which will serve as a research and action plan for expanding reentry services in the Spokane region. The project will fund the Jail Transitions Pathways Community HUB project for the Spokane region. The Pathways Community HUB is an innovative service delivery model that focuses on reducing identifiable risk factors for high-risk individuals and populations through care coordination. The Pathways Hub relies on community health workers (CHW) who will engage with participants pre-release, complete a comprehensive assessment of health, social, behavioral health, economic, and other issues, and then work with them in the community to address those issues. WSU is provided the sub-award to provide qualitative and quantitative evaluations of the project. This is a three-year project for \$120,000.

Principal Investigator. September, 2017. OPTIMIZING JUVENILE ASSESSMENT PERFORMANCE.

OJJDP FY 2017 Field-Initiated Research and Evaluation Program (CFDA # 16.540). This project utilizes over a million youth assessed on the same juvenile risk assessment and tracked for

recidivism. The study seek to identify jurisdiction variations in assessment performance and outline customizable solutions for delinquency prevention through an optimization of risk assessment performance. This is a one-year project for \$124,900.

Principal Investigator. August, 2017 CITY OF SPOKANE COMMUNITY COURT EVALUATION. This research is focused on assessing the current internal operations and outcomes of the City of Spokane Community Court. The core focus of this evaluation is a process evaluation aimed at assessing if Community Court policies and procedures are being followed as intended. The outcome evaluation will determine if individuals that participate in the Community Court have stronger outcomes than a matched comparison groups. This is a one-year project for \$49,000. Accepted.

Principal Investigator. August, 2017 CITY OF SPOKANE COMMUNITY COURT ASSESSMENT. This research is focused on assessing the current community court risk assessment utilized by the City of Spokane Community Court. The core focus of this evaluation is a process evaluation aimed at assessing if Community Court policies and procedures are being followed as intended and any additional positive benefits from it current or modified form. This is a one-year project for \$27,219. Accepted.

Principal Investigator. April, 2016. Needs and Responsivity Assessment Development of POSITIVE ACHIEVMENT CHANGE TOOL (PACT). Funded by the Washington State Administrative Office of the Courts. This project is an expansive endeavor to create needs and responsivity assessment with superior performance for predicting juvenile offending and identifying appropriate programming within the state of Washington. This is a one-year project for \$62,000. Accepted.

Principal Investigator. December, 2016. The Development of the King County Risk Assessment. Funded by King County. This project seeks to develop a version of the Static Risk Offender Needs Guide – Revised (STRONG-R) for a King County pretrial population in Washington. This is a one-year project for \$240,000. Accepted.

Principal Investigator. April, 2016. The Development of the Spokane County Risk Assessment. Funded by Spokane County. This project seeks to develop a version of the Static Risk Offender Needs Guide – Revised (STRONG-R) for a Spokane County pretrial, probation, and jail populations in Washington. This is a one-year project for \$269,000. Accepted.

Principal Investigator (with Amelie Pedneault). April, 2016. Evaluation of the Washington State Department of Corrections Second Chance Act Continuum of Care Program. Funded by the Washington State Department of Corrections this research examines findings from the statewide implementation of Washington State Department of Corrections (WADOC) Continuum of Care Program. The program is designed to help transition offenders from the institution to the community via a transition specialist, a community corrections officer (CCO), and other service providers. This team attempts to contact each offender prior to release from the institution and then again in the community. Using a quasi-experimental design, this one-year study proposes to compare a cohort of program participants with a propensity score matched comparison sample released during the study period. Study outcomes examined will include: community sanctioned jail/prison days, reconvictions, program utilization, and correctional and associated costs. Potential positive findings could reveal a replicable and easily scalable program for WADOC releases across the state, and likely to create sustainable reductions in incarceration due to community corrections sanctioning. This

is a 18-month contract for \$76,000.

Principal Investigator (with Amelie Pedneault). March, 2016. **SEX OFFENDER REGISTRATION PROJECT**. Funded by the Washington State Office of Financial Management (OFM) this research will examine variations in sex offender registry practices across counties in Washington State. A literature review of promising practices will be completed. A survey of county registration practices and an online community survey will also be constructed and distributed. Recommendations for future best practices will be included at the conclusion of the study. This is a 6-month contract for \$95,000.

Principal Investigator (with Alex Kigerl). February, 2016. **EDUCATION AND JUVENILE JUSTICE OUTCOMES**. The research project will define, research, and report on the prior education experience and outcomes by juvenile offender sentencing type. This research project will be carried out in conjunction with the Washington State Center for Court Research (WSCCR) at Washington State University. WSICJ, in conjunction and collaboration with the WSCCR, about the prior education experience and outcomes by juvenile offender sentencing type, including Juvenile Justice Rehabilitation Administration involvement, probation only, probation and treatment, and disposition alternative. As a part of this research project, WSICJ in mapping the juvenile justice data and education data, design the research study, conduct the research and statistical analysis and support production of the outputs from the research. This is a 2 year contract for \$90,000. Accepted

Principal Investigator (with Alex Kigerl & Jacqueline van Wormer). January, 2016. **WASHINGTON STATE OFFENDER RISK ASSESSMENT PROJECT**. Funded by the Washington State Department of Corrections this project will assist with the implementation of the Static Risk and Offender Needs Guide assessment system (STRONG-R) risk and needs assessment. Project deliverables include training and pilot testing of the tools, assessment of inter-rater reliability, development of quality assurance procedures, and a creation of a menu of interventions to be identified an evidenced-based programs recommended by the assessment's case management functions. This 18-month project for \$185,000. Accepted.

Funded by the Lewis and John Arnold Foundation (LJAF) this study seeks to examine findings from the statewide implementation of Washington State's Swift and Certain (SAC) program. The program, modeled after the Hawaii HOPE project's application of specific deterrence principles (Hawken & Kleiman, 2009), is the first statewide effort utilizing a large felony offender population (N~10,000). assessment for the WADOC population. Using theoretically informed modeling, this funding allowed for the creation of gender specific modeling for the WADOC's STRONG System of Assessments. This was one-year project for \$68,000.

Co-Investigator (with Jacqueline van Wormer). 2012. EVALUATION OF SNOHOMISH COUNTY THERAPEUTIC DRUG COURTS. This project funded by Snohomish County this research includes a process, outcome and cost-benefit study of the Snohomish County Adult Drug Court (ADC) and Snohomish County Family Drug Treatment Court. The evaluation is focused on assessing whether drug court participants remain crime free, complete treatment at greater rates than individuals who participate in the traditional system, and the impact of drug court participation on use of other social and health services. The cost-benefit study compares the overall operational costs of the drug court program, assesses the cost of the traditional court and treatment process, and evaluates which agencies contribute to the drug court and traditional court process and at what cost. This was a two-year project for \$200,000.
