4-H Enrollments/Re-Enrollments

4-H Enrollment and Re-enrollment will be done online again this year. Club leaders were sent help sheets to pass on to their members. Help sheets are also available at the Extension Office. The website is <https://wa.4honline.com>. Some important tips:

- Re-enrolling members and leaders already have a profile in the system-so once they are logged in they just update and verify their information.
- Re-enrolling members and leaders must use the same e-mail address to sign into the system as last year-it can be changed by the Extension Office if you no longer have access to that e-mail. **DO NOT** create a new account if you were enrolled last year. Contact Andrea at the Extension Office if you are unsure which e-mail address to use.
- The \$25 Enrollment Fee can be paid by check or cash in the Extension Office. Checks should be made payable to WSU. The fee can also be paid online by credit/debit card when re-enrolling.
- There is a computer available in the Extension Office for those who do not have internet access.
- Please contact Andrea at amorse@wsu.edu or 962-7507 if you experience any trouble.

Record Book Tips - November

- Put November dates in the calendar.
- Project plans (Level 1) or Project Record (Level 2) - Members, parents and leaders sign at November meeting. Leadership members should identify with their leader specific leadership projects they would like to take on (club officer, county teen rep, State Ambassador, teaching younger members, organizing a club activity, fundraiser or community service project). Know Your Government project members should identify in detail what they would like to get out of KYG this year.
- Project Diary (Level 1) or Project Journal (Level 2) - Start filling out if you have done something in your project area.
- Project Journal – Leadership members should record all time and money spent in a leadership role or attending teen rally, conferences, or congress.
- Permanent Record – When elections of Officers and Committees are formed in the club enter the office or committee you are in on page 1 of the Permanent Record. Record “Leadership” in project and Exhibit Summary, page 2/3.

Club Financial Reporting Due December 1

This year, the standard state requirement of an Annual Financial Summary, Peer-Audit Report, and Property Inventory still applies to all clubs, but only clubs that handled more than \$1000 and/or received more than \$500 in donations in the last 4-H year are required to turn in their Treasurer's Binder and Secretary's Book. Any club, regardless of funds handled is still subject to audit and if selected will be asked to provide the previous year's Treasurer's Binder and Secretary's Book. The forms were sent to leaders after Fair. This information is due in the Extension Office by December 1, 2018.

2. Do not miss more than three club meetings per year (Business meetings, not practice or work meetings).
3. Give at least one demonstration in each project area (horse, livestock, home economics, etc.)
4. Participate in at least one showmanship in each project area (if none available, participate in a county contest or event).
5. Complete a project to a leader’s satisfaction.
6. Complete a record book prior to fair.
7. 4-H members enrolled in a livestock project must judge at the Kittitas County Fair. 4-H members enrolled in a horse project must judge at one of the two county Horse judging contests.

The carcass contests recognize exhibitors who produced an animal that has ideal characteristics for the commercial market. For each species, the measurements are compared against a set of standards that describe the ideal market animal. Hog, lamb, and goat carcass data is obtained using real-time ultrasound. The steer carcass data comes directly from live data collection.



These Merit programs were established over 20 years ago in Washington to provide a set of standards for recognizing 4-H and FFA members who were exhibiting desirable market animals. Exhibitors whose animals qualified received a special premium from the Kittitas County Fair with their Fair Premium checks. The purpose of the program is to: 1) help youth learn to humanely care for, feed, manage, show, and fit animals; and 2) help youth learn that humane animal care is essential to providing a quality performance.

The Equine Quality Assurance and Animal Care kit is available for 4-H Horse clubs to check out. There are many educational and interesting activities to help youth learn about animal care and how proper care will affect their animal's appearance as well as its performance. **All first year 4-H Horse Project members are required to complete Level 1, Units 1, 2, and 4 and all second year and above members are required to complete Level 1, Units 3, 5, and 6 of the Quality Assurance Program.**

CALLING FOR KITTITAS COUNTY 4-H CHALLENGE FACILITATORS

The Kittitas County 4-H Council is looking for interested 4-H Leaders and parents that would be interested in training and facilitating the Kittitas County 4-H Portable Challenge activities. Kittitas Challenge trained facilitators have dwindled in the past years and would like get new volunteers trained to continue this valuable program.

Kittitas County 4-H Portable Challenge is a part of the Washington State 4-H Challenge Program and the Kittitas County 4-H program and fits under the Kittitas County 4-H Council.

4-H Portable Challenge is an exciting youth development program combining experiential learning activities to build self-confidence, self-esteem, and basic but critical life skills. The program has a proven record with a diverse youth population, including families.

The Portable Challenge program is available to Kittitas County 4-H Clubs and families as well as other groups and organizations within the county.

What is the 4-H Portable Challenge Program?

The 4-H Portable Challenge program incorporates a series of games and activities where group and individual tasks are conducted under careful supervision. The Challenge Course offers a series of manageable challenges. Completion of each activity requires adult leaders and youth to learn and develop the skills of goal setting, problem solving, decision making, communication with others and applying oneself with total commitment. In the process, participants learn how to reflect upon their experiences and gain insight into personal and social behaviors and attitudes which they can apply in different settings.

The 4-H Portable challenge course is a “learn by doing” mechanism that gives youth immediate feedback and personal and group success. It provides a way for groups and individuals to learn teamwork and solve problems while experiencing fun and adventure at the same time. The 4-H Portable challenge program is about encouraging leadership potential in youth and creating learning opportunities using the Portable Challenge Equipment.

Is This Like An Obstacle Course?

No, it is not a race. The Portable Challenge Program is designed to be done as a *group*, speed is not important. It brings out the strengths and abilities in each participant. The focus is on the process the group goes through to complete the task.

What Will I Be Doing In A Challenge Activity?

You will be participating in a series of activities that will challenge you to push yourself beyond your perceived limits. These activities cannot be done alone, you must have the support, abilities, strengths and weaknesses of the group.

What Do Participants Gain From A 4-H Portable Challenge Activity?

Groups use the 4-H Portable Challenge Program for many different reasons. Some groups are trying to foster teamwork and cooperation; others are hoping to develop problem solving and decision making skills. The activities at the course will relate to the participants life.

- Age 21 or older
- Two trainers required per event
- Work with Challenge coordinator and other facilitators
- Volunteer time required for at least 2 years following the training
- CPR First Aid Certificate is required
- Must facilitate minimum of two events a year
- Must complete/submit 4-H group enrollment form for each group to coordinator
- Must complete/submit Special Activities Insurance Coverage Plan 3 to coordinator
- Reserve equipment with coordinator/Extension Office
- Check-out and check-in equipment
- Collect/submit fees (usage and insurance) to coordinator
- Inventory for completeness (note repair and replacement) with coordinator
- Evaluate challenge program annually
- Evaluate each event
