4-H CALENDAR DATES

The 4-H office needs your activity dates for the 2019-2020 4-H year events as soon as possible.

HORSE EVENT DATES

For state qualifying horse events, please have dates to the 4-H Office by **February 1st, 2020** so they can be advertised widely.

ANNUAL FINANCIAL SUMMARIES

Financial Summaries are due on or before **December 1st**. There is no grace period this year. If your club has no funds, write "We do not handle funds" on the Annual Financial Summary and sign the form. If your club has no property, write "We do not own property" on the Property Inventory Form. Please return these forms to the Extension Office by **December 1st**. **There will be NO grace period for these forms**.

ANIMAL OWNERSHIP TIMELINES

4-H members need to be completely enrolled (forms completed, signed and turned in to the Extension Office, their Club Assessment fee paid) and their animals must be under the 4-H member's regular care and management for the following periods of time prior to the official county exhibit activity, including junior livestock shows:

Rabbits and Poultry – 45 days

Dogs – 60 days

Cavies – 45 days

Dogs – 60 days

Cavies – 45 days

Goat – 60 days

Llama – 90 days

Sheep and Swine (breeding and market) – 60 days (Swine see rule 5C for CWJLS) – 90 days

Equine – 90 days (make sure your horse certificate is on file 90 days before first show/event)

Dairy – 90 days Dairy Heifer Replacement – 60 days (make sure your dairy certificate is on file 90 or 60 days before your first show/event)

Market Beef – 120 days, Breeding Beef – 90 days Animals raised by the 4-H member from birth or hatching are exempt from the minimum time periods.

CENTRAL WASHINGTON JUNIOR LIVESTOCK SHOW RULE

(C) Animals must be under the care and management of the exhibitor for the following time prior to the fair:

Beef - 120 days

Lambs - 60 days

Swine - 90 days

The exhibitor must have the proper paperwork from the County/State that the exhibitor resides in. The animal must reside in the same county as the exhibitor. Furthermore, final decisions on this topic will be at the discretion of show management.

CWJLS PRE-TAG AND WEIGH DAY

The Central Washington Junior Livestock Show Steer pre-tag and weigh day on **January 5**, 2020, 1:00 pm - 3:00 pm at the Toppenish Livestock Sales Yard. When you purchase your steer, you will need to have the seller fill out an affidavit from the brand department. You cannot download this form it has to be picked up from the brand department. You must have this form to present at the tag and weigh. If you purchase your steer from a sale and the brand paperwork is in, you the exhibitors' name you will not need the affidavit. **A handwritten bill of sale will no longer be accepted.** For more information or questions, please call Barb Bailey 509-985-9048.

YAKAMA CARES

Yakama Legends Casino and its employees understand the importance of being good citizens to the Community and that this is paramount for good business. We give two percent (2%) of our Class III Table Games Revenue to a Community Impact Fund. Funds are then distributed once a year by a Community Impact Fund Committee. This committee is made up of five local community government representatives. These funds have made it possible to purchase fire trucks, ambulances and police vehicles. They have also provided funds for road improvements and other community projects. Yakama Legends Casino also has other payments for impact costs, community impacts, and charitable donations from 1% of the CIII gaming revenue machines. One half of the 1% is for charitable donations and the other half of the 1% covers the impact costs and tribal community impacts. Applications for the non-Tribal non-profit organization can be submitted yearly to the Charitable Fund Committee from January 1 through March 31, and these funds will be distributed in May of each year. Applications need to be made in a letter format stating:

- 1. Name of Organization
- 2. What this Organization does
- 3. How much money the Organization is seeking
- 4. How this money will be utilized (spent)
- 5. A copy of a Certified Washington State Non-profit

BEGINNING THE 4-H YEAR

<u>Share the Leadership Load</u> – When you share the leadership with your officers you share the responsibility, involve members in a more meaningful way, and give them "up front" experience. Often adults feel they need to "run things" to keep meetings going smoother and faster. Members react to adult-run clubs, often by disruptive behavior, dropping out, or a general lack of enthusiasm. If you are experiencing some of these signals, here are some tips to build the club back to "member-owned".

- ☑ Select an adult in your club to be officer liaison.
- ☑ Have a special officer retreat. Get to know these kids and let them see you as behind-the-scenes-help. Explain, show, role model, rehearse the expectations for their office.
- Meet regularly and ahead of time with the officers. Allow them to build the agenda for each meeting. Your job is to provide them with the tools to succeed at their job <u>prior</u> to the meeting.
- ☑ Involve officers in mapping out a program plan for the year. Club or Group Planning Book (CO227) is a useful tool for this.
- ✓ Together, go through a check sheet "Points To Look For In A Good Meeting". This exercise is explained in the Mostly Meeting section of the 4-H Club Leaders Handbook.

4-H ENROLLMENT YEAR 2019-2020

As of January 1, 2020, the enrollment process will be changed. Please try to be enrolled by that time.

4-H will continue using the 4-H online enrollment process. Each family is responsible for enrolling their family members. Each year the youth members and adult volunteers need to re-enrolled.

A **valid email** is critical to the re-enrolling family's ability to log-in successfully.

Some key things to remember are:

Make sure all names and addresses are complete and correct. Please double check email addresses for accuracy since the 4-H Focus, and other 4-H information will be sent out by email.

- Make sure the members date of birth is accurate, this will determine the division they are to exhibit in.
- ## If you are paying by credit card, click the orange button and add your credit card information, this needs to be done for each youth member you are enrolling. I know that part is frustrating, they are working on it. Each youth members pay \$25.00, volunteers don't pay the fee.
- Club annual financial summary records for the past project year are due **DECEMBER 1**.

THE SEWING & STITCHERY EXPO

is a WSU owned and managed event, heading into its 36th year at the Washington State Fairgrounds in Puyallup. The 2020 show is Thursday, February 27-Sunday, March 1. We know that sewing is a fundamental and important skill, and we want to make sure that kids in 4-H and other youth organizations have access to it. We have a 4-H Fashion Show on Saturday, February 29, organized by Laura Mendoza, and we would love to increase our involvement with 4-H youth and leaders statewide. We will have sewing areas for the two charities we support, with on-site help from sewing teachers and representation from the charities. We encourage kids and families to stop by on Sunday, March 1, to try their hand

at a few stitches or even complete a whole project. We will also offer kids-focused classes on Sunday, with youth skill-building in mind. https://sewexpo.com/

TEACH COMPUTER SCIENCE THROUGH GAME PLAY!

Are you a teacher, educator, or youth program leader? WSU Yakima County Extension is offering grants to supply local classrooms and youth programs with Game Changers kits at no cost.

Game Changers is a collection of three activities that teaches kids computer science (CS) skills through game play, puzzles and animation all centered around topics they care about. Game Changers includes a computer-based activity on Google's CS First platform and two unplugged activities that can be done all at once or individually.

Game Changers is highly adaptable for classrooms, afterschool programs, clubs and more!

- Perfect for first-time and beginner coders ages 8-14
- Each kit is designed to accommodate up to 10 youth.
- Teachers and facilitators do not need any prior experience with computer science or coding.
- Each kit contains all the materials required to complete the activities with or without internet.

Activity Highlights

Pitch Your Passion is an online activity that teaches kids to use CS and animation to advocate for a cause or issue they care about using CS First and Scratch.

Program Your Playground is an unplugged activity where kids use CS skills like decomposition and conditional logic to design their own versions of tag and invent new sports and games.

Hack Your Harvest is an unplugged activity where kids will use CS concepts like automation optimal efficiency to solve and create logic puzzles related to agriculture—or any topic kids can think of.

Supply-Grant Requirements Include:

- Reach 10 youth per kit who participate in at least 6 hours of activities (that includes any optional take-home activity time).
- Complete programming by Dec. 31, 2019.
- Submit a simple report (template provided) by Dec. 31, 2019, to share participant demographics, program location information, and any highlights or challenges.
- Recognition of program partners and sponsors in any communication about programming.

What is National Youth Science Day?

Game Changers was developed in celebration of National Youth Science Day (NYSD), which occurs in month of October, and to provide access and opportunity for kids to learn about STEM topics by participating in a hands-on STEM challenge. While 4-H highlights STEM activities in October, Game Changer activities can be facilitated anytime, anywhere!
