

The SNAP-Ed Difference

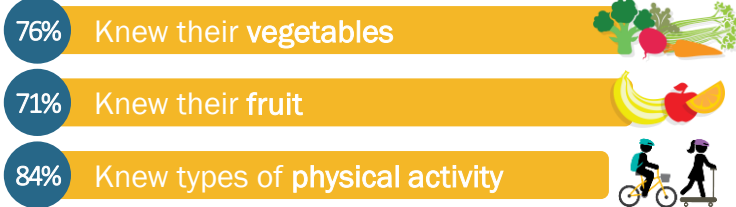
SNAP-Ed programs teach people how to choose healthy food for themselves and their families while stretching their food dollars. In the first quarter of FFY 2020, Washington State SNAP-Ed conducted **264** direct education programs, reaching **5,323** youth and **260** adults.

Youth Education Outcomes

Students with perfect scores on surveys after nutrition education



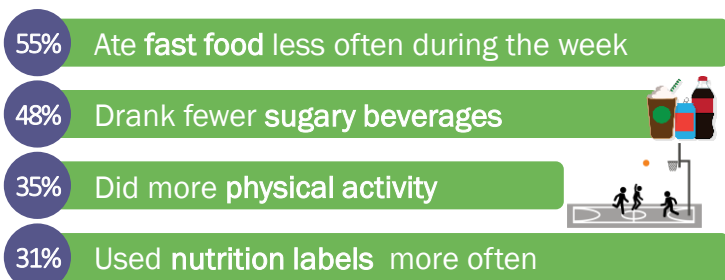
3rd – 12th Graders
