



2023 year in review

December 2023

The WeGrow Garden is an urban garden in the heart of Bellingham comprised of 32 raised beds, fruit trees, composting systems, and native and perennial plantings that support pollinators and enhance green space in our urban core.

The garden is a successful collaboration between the WSU Whatcom County Extension, City of Bellingham Parks, and over a dozen schools, non-profits, and business partners. WSU WeGrow is dedicated to increasing food security, demonstrating sustainable practices, and providing space for community education, youth programs, vocational training, and public engagement. Whatcom County Agriculture is rich in tradition and production and the WeGrow garden creates connections with farmers large and small by training youth and residents to understand and value the crops that sustain them.

WSU WeGrow provides low-barrier vocational training and education by partnering with WSU Whatcom Master Gardeners. Together we plant, grow, harvest, and distribute produce to those in need. As a Bellingham Food Bank Victory Garden, we donate over 1000 pounds of produce each season. The garden also serves as an educational space for school groups, non-profit youth agencies, and the public. Showcasing how food is grown and managed is critical to a resilient community. As a vibrant living lab for horticultural learning, we seek to build on our successes each year and expand our partnerships, classes and public access.

VOLUNTEERISM over 500 hours of volunteering in the garden. Twice a week work parties included teaching youth and adults.

Activities included:

- Garden production: preparing planting beds, planting, harvesting.
- Garden maintenance: weeding, composting, bark mulching
- Public education
- Prepping and eating with freshly harvested produce.

FOOD SECURITY - FOOD BANK CONTRIBUTIONS

- 1200 pounds of fresh produce grow and donated to Bellingham Food Bank
- 34 Harvest dates from June October
- Produce included: squash, potatoes, tomatoes, green beans, tomatillos, peppers, cabbage, cucumbers, onions, rhubarb, garlic, leeks, beets, kale, cauliflower, radishes, apples, berries, Flowers, lettuce, herbs.

2024 Goals

- Expansion of youth enrichment to include home school groups.
- ADA compliance making the garden more accessible to the elderly and those with disabilities.
- Maintenance and repairs to existing raised beds, installation of a few new metal raised beds each year, as funding allows, beginning in 2024.
- New demonstrations, classes (eg., container gardening for planting fruits and veggies in small spaces)

PUBLIC ENGAGEMENT

The garden is located on a high use public trail and adjacent to Whatcom Creek, the Bellingham Food bank, and local businesses. It is within walking distance of 4 schools and the bus line. The public benefits of this garden are direct and indirect. The value of a space for all to come and enjoy and learn is just as important as the beauty and stewardship that is offered.
