Required Clothing

You must have at least one set of everything, except as noted. A second set (or more) is highly recommended as you will likely get wet.



General Guidelines

- No cotton anywhere even your underwear and socks!
- Use multiple thin layers that can be combined or removed to prevent sweating.
- Strive for plenty of zippers or other openings to allow for venting.
- The general layering guideline is 3:2:1. The torso is covered with 3 times more clothing than, and the limbs with twice as much as, the feet, head and hands. Slightly cooler hands and feet actually stimulate your body to produce more heat.
- Remember that your agency can dictate what you look like on the outside, but <u>not</u> what you wear underneath or what you carry in your pack for emergencies. Agency-issued clothing is often inadequate for winter field work, so ensure the layers underneath are the best you can afford.

Wicking: thin silk / wool / synthetics which will quickly move sweat away from your skin	
	Liner gloves
	Liner socks
	Long underwear bottoms
	Long-sleeved top; if turtleneck it should have a neck zipper to vent
<u>Warmth</u> : wool / synthetics / down; better to have several thin layers (of increasing sizes) than one thick layer	
	Shirt(s) / jacket(s) / sweater
	Pants
	Stocking cap / balaclava (one of each is recommended)
	Neck gaiter (if not using a balaclava)
	Socks; heavy, tall hiking style (at least 2 sets required)
	Mittens / gloves; some of each is best (at least 2 sets required)
Wind : wind proof and water resistant, but <u>breathable</u> and uninsulated.	
	Jacket, preferably with hood
	Pants, preferably full side zip (bibs optional)
	Gaiters, knee-high
	Overmitts
	Booney style hat (if no hood)
	Waterproofed boots; must fit snowshoe bindings, be warm and comfortable but still give good support
Optional Clothing	
While not required, these are highly recommended.	
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	Lightweight pair of boots / shoes for classroom sessions
	Civilian clothes for networking evening and other off-duty times
	Vest; to augment your Warmth layer
	Over-whites for camouflage; synthetics are better than cotton (even Tyvek coveralls)
