

- ▲ Understand and demonstrate how to alter minimum-impact behavior during emergency situations.




Leave No Trace

1. Plan Ahead and Prepare



(More on this in Survival & Nav classes)

- ▲ Know your abilities.
- ▲ Choose your route wisely.
- Have adequate gear and know how to use it.
- ▲ Plan meals well (no leftovers, minimal garbage).
- ▲ Leave trip info.
- ▲ Know local regs.
- ▲ Avoid crowds.



2. Travel & Camp on Durable Surfaces



- ▲ Sand, rock, gravel, ice, and snow are good.
- ▲ Good campsites are found, not made.
- ▲ Concentrate use in heavily impacted areas (single file on trails; go through mud, not around).
- ▲ Disperse use in pristine areas to minimize impact (don't walk single file).



3. Dispose of Waste Properly



- ▲ Pack it in, pack it out.
- ▲ Pick-up micro-trash.
- Wash away from water and camp. Soap??
- Don't pee on plants or near water / camp.
- ▲ Use established toilets or a cat hole.
- ▲ TP: natural vs. artificial, burial vs. packing out.



Human Waste in Winter



- ▲ Can't bury in frozen ground.
- ▲ Snow melts out, leaving mess behind.
- ▲ Burning not practical.
- ▲ Pack out waste & TP.
 - Doubled zip-locks.
 - Paper bag with a PVC tube.







4. Leave What You Find



- ▲ Take nothing but pictures.
- ▲ Don't contribute anything to nature.
- ▲ Don't damage anything; plants, rocks, etc.
- ▲ What if everyone took only one little thing....



5. Minimize Campfire Impacts




- ▲ Check local regulations and fire danger levels.
- ▲ Use a stove.
- Use established fire pits or mound fire.
- ▲ Rock rings??
- ▲ Use <u>small</u>, <u>dead</u> and <u>down</u> wood (no smoke or charred remains).
- ▲ Disperse ashes.



6. Respect Wildlife



- ▲ This is their home; put yourself in their shoes.
- Avoid contact or influencing behavior.
- ▲ Flight or warning calls can alert others to your presence.
- ▲ Don't feed.
- ▲ Store food properly.
- Don't camp near water or trails.
- ▲ Obey game laws.



7. Be Considerate of Other Visitors



- ▲ Do unto others...
- ▲ Minimize noise.
- ▲ Minimize lights.
- ▲ Use subdued colors for clothes & tent.
- ▲ Find an unobtrusive campsite.
- ▲ Yield the right of way to faster travelers and stock animals on trails.



Emergency Considerations




- ▲ Leave No Trace principles can be altered (not abandoned) to fit desperate situations.
- ▲ <u>Do whatever you need to do</u> in order to survive, but don't be wasteful about it.
- ▲ Try to work with nature, not against it.

1. Plan Ahead and Prepare



- ▲ The usual advice applies, but is even more critical.
- ▲ This is the time to **STOP**.
- Don't get more lost or make the situation worse.
- ▲ Initiate emergency procedures per trip plan.



2. Travel & Camp on Durable Surfaces



- ▲ Durable surfaces are usually the easiest to travel upon.
- ▲ Consider whether you are trackable.
- ▲ Mark your backtrail with cairns, flagging, etc.



3. Dispose of Waste Properly



- Before you discard anything, consider any possible uses.
- ▲ All sanitation aspects still apply; bury human waste.
- ▲ Discarded trash may help you to be tracked, but be purposeful (not random) while littering.



4. Leave What You Find



- ▲ Take only those things you need to get by.
- ▲ Don't harvest more than you can use.
- ▲ Take items (such as evergreen boughs) from several sources instead of just one.
- Preserve plant foods by drying.






- ▲ Safety is still paramount.
- ▲ Build only as large as is necessary.
- ▲ Beware of possible consequences!
- **▲** Extinguish completely!
- ▲ Burning live plants may be justified for smoke.

6. Respect Wildlife



- ▲ Don't harvest more than you can use.
- ▲ Try to kill humanely.
- ▲ Use all parts fully:
 - Bones, skins, organs, sinew
- Dry surplus meat into jerky.



7. Be Considerate of Other Visitors



- ▲ Don't make your rescuers' jobs more difficult or dangerous. Be a cooperative search target.
- ▲ If safe to do so, just sit tight and signal for help.
- ▲ Disregard the usual advice about keeping a low profile and try to be bright and loud.
- ▲ Don't forget to play well with others in your party. Stress can bring out the worst in people.





Being a ghost in the woods is an important skill to master.

It will make you a more effective officer and could even save your life.
