Oakley, Coordinator <a href="http://libarts.wsu.edu/genstudies/">http://libarts.wsu.edu/genstudies/</a> 509-335-8731</p> <p>Global studies examines economic, political, social, cultural, and scientific practices in a transnational and cross-cultural perspective. <u>The Global Studies minor is designed to provide students with an integrated exposure to globally related scholarship across the disciplines, and An undergraduate minor in global studies</u> encourages a student in any major discipline to think in terms of the globalization that marks the contemporary world. The program of study is designed to provide an exciting interdisciplinary global perspective on the arts, humanities, social sciences, and sciences. The minor is flexible and complements majors from across the University, affording students the opportunity to reach beyond their majors or to take courses related to their majors outside of the context of the United States.</p> <p><u>To certify towards the minor, students must have completed at least 60 credits hours with a 2.0 GPA or above. To earn the minor, students must complete a minimum of 18-19 credit hours: 1 core course in each student learning outcome category (12-13 credits), and 2 course electives (6 credits) in any of the thematic categories listed in the program of studies, but targeting two different learning outcomes. At least 9 credits of approved coursework must be taken at the 300-400 level, and no courses taken Pass/Fail will count towards the 18/19 credit requirement. Six hours of approved transfer work may be counted towards the minor; the remaining 12/13 hours must be taken in residence at WSU or through WSU-approved education abroad or educational exchange courses. No more than two courses with the same prefix can be applied to the minor. Some courses may be substituted with the approval of the Global Studies Minor advisor. Additional courses may be included within the minor as developed in the university curriculum.</u></p> <p><b><u>Student Learning Outcomes:</u></b> The minor gives students a competitive edge in the global job market. made from historical, cultural, economic, and political contexts that shape society and reflect global systems; 2) demonstrate knowledge of and be sensitive to others' differing identities and values across cultures; 3) apply intercultural communication skills to interact effectively with individuals and in groups; and 4) interact respectfully and responsibly across boundaries in diverse environments.

**Program of Studies:**

**Core Courses:** Choose one from ANTH 203, CES 244, ECON 101, POL S 103, or SOC 415. Choose one from ANTH 316, FINE ART 202, or POL S 428. Choose one from: COM 105, COMSOC 321, or FOR LANG 120. PLUS, complete one semester of foreign language study at WSU beyond the WSU admissions requirement. Foreign language courses taken at WSU to fulfill the admissions requirement are not eligible to be applied to the minor.

~~The minor requires 18 credit hours and must include 9 hours of upper-division work taken in residence at WSU or through WSU-approved education abroad or educational exchange courses. Students should select one track from the three listed in the course requirements, and one module from those listed within each track. Some courses may be substituted with the approval of the Director of Global Studies. In particular, many course equivalents may be taken through a study abroad program, and students are encouraged to discuss these with the Director of Global Studies. <p><b>Foreign Languages and Cultures</b> Revise minor in Film Studies</p>	<p><b>Film Studies</b></p> <p><u>The Film Studies Minor introduces students to the critical study of cinema and media studies. It explores how cinema both reflects and influences the facts, ideas, and activities of any given society, and how film allows us to travel to most places in the world and become familiar with diverse cultures, traditions, and ways of thinking. The film studies minor also teaches students how to discern the cinematic and narrative features that are used in cinematography and how culture can influence them. The study of film encourages critical thinking, respect for cultural diversity, and detailed knowledge of film as a text of facts and ideas.</u></p> <p><u>The minor's program of studies is designed by the student in collaboration with the coordinator and /or the advisor. A minimum of 18 credits is required and must include 9 hours of upper-division work taken in residence at WSU or through WSU-approved education abroad or educational exchange courses. 9 credits must be chosen from COM 471/CES 404, ENGLISH 150, 339, FOR LANG 110, 410, PHIL 210, and <del>or</del> SOC 372 or 373. An additional 9 elective credits geared toward social, cultural, or applied skills are chosen-required. Approved courses include from the following:</u></p> <p><u>People and Cultural Perspectives: CES 338, 379, CHINESE 111, FOR LANG 410, FRENCH 110, 111, 310, 311, GERMAN 110, 310, RUSSIAN 410, SPANISH 110, 111, 310, 311, WOMEN ST 340. <p><b>Speech and Hearing Sciences</b> Revise graduation requirements for Bachelor of Arts in Speech and Hearing Studies</p>	<p><b>Speech and Hearing Sciences(120 Hours)</b></p> <p>Certification Requirements: Given the rigorous nature of the coursework and the need to prepare students for work in a pre-professional role or to prepare them for the competitive demands of applying to graduate school in the discipline, students must meet the following minimum requirements to be eligible to certify a major in Speech and Hearing Sciences: 1) Have earned a minimum of 24 credits of undergraduate credits; 2) Have taken, or currently enrolled in, SHS 205, Introduction to Speech-Language Pathology &amp; Audiology; 3) minimum cumulative GPA of 2.75.</p> <p>At least 45 of the total hours required for the bachelor’s degree in this program must be in 300-400-level courses. Successful completion of SHS 473[M] and <del>478</del> 482 [M] fulfills the university requirement of two writing in the major courses, <del>designated [M]</del>.</p> <p>The Speech and Hearing Sciences Department provides preparation for professional (graduate) training as a speech-language pathologist or audiologist. This course sequence is based on fall enrollment. <p><b>Undergraduate Education</b> Revise undergraduate certificate requirements for Global Leadership Certificate</p>	<p><b>Global Leadership Certificate</b></p> <p><del>Global Leadership Certificate:</del></p> <p>Undergraduate Education also offers the Global Leadership Certificate, in partnership with the Office of International Programs. The Global Leadership Certificate is structured around coursework and co-curricular experiences that empower students to analyze, adapt, communicate, problem-solve, and empathize in a variety of professional and personal networks. Taken together, the academic and co-curricular components build self-reliance, leadership and team skills in a global framework.</p> <p><b><u>Requirements for the Global Leadership Certificate (4 sections, 15 credits total):</u></b></p> <p>1) <i>Four (4) Courses (12 credits)</i></p> <p><del>Selected coursework addresses contemporary global/intercultural issues and be aligned with the three objectives/competency areas. Courses taken during an education abroad experience may also count for this requirement. Up to four credit hours of foreign language at or above the 200 level may be applied. Courses approved for inclusion in the program address contemporary issues, involve a language and culture different from student's immediate context, and/or be concerned with issues that cross national borders or international regions.</del></p> <p><u>A minimum of four globally-related courses (twelve credits) may be applied to fulfill the academic coursework requirement for the Global Leadership Certificate. At least six credits must be taken at the 300-400 level. Approved courses include but are not limited to ANTH 203, 316, 418; COM 105, COMSOC 321, ECONS 101, ENVR S 101, FINE ART 202, I BUS 380; POL S 103, 418, 427; WOMEN ST 332; or as approved by advisor. 2) *Experiential Learning (1 credit; UNIV 497490)*

Students will fulfill the experiential requirement in one of two ways:

~~**Intensive International/Intercultural/Civic Engagement Experience:-**~~

~~An international or domestic immersion experience such as education abroad, internship, exchange program, alternative spring break, service learning, eco-adventure, or research experience. The intensive experience must be of at least one week's duration and satisfy academic requirements for one credit. The experience will involve at least 45 hours of learning to satisfy the academic requirements for one credit.~~

~~**Sustained "Globalization at home" Intercultural/Civic Engagement Experience:-**~~

~~Local volunteer, internship, or service learning experiences with a global focus will fulfill this requirement. These experiences may be complemented by attendance at intercultural or civic engagement events (lectures, international student group celebrations, Common Reading Program activities, community group events, etc.). Sustained experiences require a total of 45 hours to satisfy the academic requirements for one credit.~~

A) *Intensive*: An intensive experience is one in which students are immersed in an international or domestic globally-related program or project for a specific period of time. These experiences include but are not limited to participation in education abroad, international or domestic academic research/internship/service learning, or an alternative spring break program. The intensive experience must be at least one week in duration and engage the student in a minimum of 45 hours.

B) *Sustained*: A sustained experience is one in which students participate "at home" over the course of one semester in globally-related service learning that engages them in a complex global issue such as poverty, hunger, health, economic development, or sustainability. Student may also fulfil the sustained

experience through an approved globally –related internship or volunteer experience. Sustained experiences must be a minimum of 45 hours occurring within one semester.

3) *Leadership in a Global Context (1 credit, UNIV 497)*

All students will complete the section of UNIV 497, Peer Leadership, specifically designed to fulfill requirements for the Global Leadership Certificate.

4) *Integrative Capstone (1 credit, UNIV 491)*

Completion of the Integrative Capstone course enables the student to plan and design a project that advances their global leadership knowledge, experiences, and skills.
