
APPLY FOR ADMISSION TO PSYCH

- Students currently enrolled in Psych 311 are able to apply for admission to Psych <u>before</u> the semester ends (you do not need to wait for your grade to be posted)
- Apply using this link: <u>psychology.wsu.edu/psychology-major-certification-request</u>
- Once spring grades post you will be admitted as long as you:
 - Earn a C- or higher in Psych 311
 - Have a 2.5 or higher cumulative WSU GPA
 - 30 completed credit hours
- You are not notified when you are admitted to psych. Check your academic requirements in myWSU to verify that you have been admitted to psych
- Once admitted to your primary major you may reach out to your minor/additional major advisor to request to have your minor/additional major added to your plan

UNIVERSITY WRITING PORTFOLIO

- This graduation requirement is due during your first semester after completing 60 (or more) credits
- Students who have 60+ credits <u>and</u> have not submitted the writing portfolio receive a registration hold on their account
- Students cannot enroll in future classes until taking care of this hold
- Step-by-step instructions for submitting the writing portfolio may be found using this link writingprogram.wsu.edu/uwpsubmission
- Priority enrollment for fall begins April 8 so there is still time to submit before you enroll for fall

The Department of Criminal Justice and Criminology and the Complex Social Interactions Lab at Washington State University are pleased to offer paid summer research internships through our NSF REU (Research Experience for Undergraduates) program where students have the opportunity to study police and race using body-worn camera footage.


Who should apply to this REU?

Students from any major who are interested in studying race and policing. Prior experience with criminal justice research is not required, though applicants must have completed a research methods course.

Requirements:

Must be a current student who is a U.S. citizen or permanent resident, pass a criminal history check, submit fingerprints to FBI database, complete level 2 Security Awareness Training Certificate, and sign confidentiality agreement.

Program Dates: June 3, 2024 through August 2, 2024



This 9 week program runs over the course of the summer and, in addition to hands on research experience, includes professional development seminars, social activities, networking, and presenting at the WSU Undergraduate Summer Research Symposium. Students will gain hands on experience working with data and using software like Excel, Access, and R-Studio.

UC Irvine Post-Baccalaureate Program in Psychological Science



The UC Irvine Post-Baccalaureate Program in Psychological Science is a certificate program that combines psychology coursework with research and/or internship experience.

Our post-bacc program is designed for people who: 1) Have a bachelor's degree (in any discipline) and 2) Are interested in a psychology-related graduate program, career development, or career change and 3) Could benefit from additional coursework, research and/ or hands-on work experience in psychology. Those interested in a doctoral-level or master's degree programs in a range of areas of psychology (including clinical/counseling psychology, social/personality psychology, developmental psychology, health psychology, psychology & the law, and school psychology) or health (e.g., public health, medical school) can strengthen their graduate school applications by completing our program, which offers an individualized course of study based on each person's qualifications and goals. Students who have completed our program have been accepted to a wide variety of graduate programs, including Ph.D. programs at UC Berkeley, the University of Pennsylvania, UCLA, and UT Austin; Psy.D. programs at Xavier University, Baylor University, and Yeshiva University; and Master's programs at the University of Michigan and the University of Southern California.

Program Components

The program consists of eight courses, which may include lower- and upper-division lectures, small seminars (including advanced statistics and research methods), hands-on research lab courses, and/or hands-on internship courses. The program can be completed at the student's own pace, in as little as 9 months or in as many as 24 months, depending upon one's schedule and preferences. A faculty advisor will work closely with students to help plan courses and provide guidance on obtaining letters of recommendation, choosing graduate programs, writing personal statements, and applying for jobs. In addition, students will have the opportunity to attend our weekly departmental colloquia and other special events and to interact with our community of faculty, researchers, and graduate students.



Hands of Hope AmeriCorps Members provide direct care and supervision to children ages infant to age 6 in foster care in the Casa de Esperanza Neighborhood during a 12-month service year program. They work collaboratively with AmeriCorps Members and other professionals in the home to ensure that children's physical, emotional, and developmental needs are met.

Hands of Hope AmeriCorps Members Provide

- A safe and loving home to young children who have experienced trauma
- An environment where kids are free to be kids
- Daily care of the children, household management, and coordination of medical appointments and therapy sessions
- The opportunity for children to grow and develop by helping meet their physical, emotional, and developmental needs

Hands of Hope AmeriCorps Members Receive

- \$23,800 annual living allowance, paid bi-weekly
- \$6,895 Segal AmeriCorps Education Award upon successful completion of the service year
- Health insurance through Equal Heart
- Fully furnished housing in a private, gated community
