The following letter is from one of last year's award recipients, Keesha Matz. Thank you for your continued support for the scholarship fund.

Dear Members of the Emeritus Society,

I recently had the honor of receiving the 2016 Undergraduate Research Award in the Biosciences category from the Emeritus Society. I am from Chehalis, Washington and currently finishing my second year of studies in Microbiology here at Washington State University.

Through an independent research project in high school I got interested in gene silencing and its implications on devastating illnesses such as diabetes and cancer. I was fascinated in the possibilities that scientific research has to improve the lives of people around the world. This was the defining moment in high school that got me interested in pursuing a career in medical research. I came to Washington State University in part for the Students Targeted towards Advanced Research Studies (STARS) within the School of Molecular Biosciences. This is a highly-selective accelerated Ph.D. program in which I can earn a doctorate degree in as little as 7 years. During my freshman year at WSU I got involved in virology research with Dr. Hector Aguilar-Carreno. This has been a fascinating experience to learn about the viral entry and exit mechanisms of Nipah Virus. This is the research that I presented at SURCA this year.

During my time here at WSU I look forward to learning and exploring the wide variety of science related opportunities. Already I have also presented at multiple scientific competition and received awards of excellence. It is incredible to be able to apply what I have been learning in my classes to research that I am doing in the laboratory. Aside from classes and research I am part of the WSU Honors College which allows me to expand my knowledge and experiences beyond science. I also enjoy traveling and experiencing different regions of the world. Last summer I had the opportunity to travel to Costa Rica for a full immersion Spanish program. Aside from school I enjoy spending time in the outdoors and I recently learned to scuba dive through a class on campus.

This summer I will continue to conduct research on campus. I plan to pursue a Ph.D. in Virology at WSU and become a scientific researcher. It is my goal to help those struggling with illness and disease caused by viruses through advances in medical treatments. I greatly appreciate your support and I accept this scholarship as a great honor. It will help immensely with the costs of college and I am truly grateful for your support.
